for supplies during the first three months of this year about 15 per cent below the last three months of 1944 and also the first quarter of last year. This applies to both rationed and unrationed kinds. Hog production available for slaughter is about 25 per cent below a year ago.
Says OPA: "Food rationing, in effect, must be placed on a pay-as-you-go basis. During the next few months, and perhaps throughout 1945, ration stamps will be only good on the basis of the supplies that can be made available to civilians without upsetting the fairest distribution obtainable. Shortages in some items, such as butter, may continue. The choice and variety of meats and canned fruits and vegetables may continue to be spotty in some cities. But as closely as possible point values will be maintained to assure the shopper a reasonable choice of rationed foods."
How Farmers Can Get Lumber
Farmers who need lumber for emergency maintenance and repair of farm dwellings may now apply to the War Food Administration for preference ratings instead of to the War Production Board Field Offices. WPD's Office of Civilian

LIGHT FOR HOMEWORK. Has your boy or girl a good table lamp for studying and homework? In the dark winter months, when youngsters spend a good deal of time poring over books, eyesight protection is doubly important. Be sure your child has plenty of good, diffused light, free from glare and harsh shadows. A suitable reading lamp should have not less than a 100-watt bulb, properly shaded.

OVEN Dainties. For doubly tasty home-baked cookies, follow this welcome recipe from our Home Service Department:

Cherry Cookies
1/2 cup shortening 1 tbs. lemon juice
1/2 cup sugar 3 cup cake flour
1 egg yolk 1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup vanilla 1 egg white
1 tbs. grated orange rind 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts

Cream the shortening, add sugar gradually and the egg yolk. Beat thoroughly. Add the vanilla, orange rind, lemon juice, flour and salt. Chill until firm. Mold into small balls. Roll egg white slightly, dip dough into the egg white and press a slice of cherry in each cookie. Bake in preheated oven. Time, 20 minutes. Temperature, 350° F.
