Lt. William D. Campbell, Jr., who was recently home on leave, after receiving his commission at Hondo, Texas, is located at the Army Air Base at Boca Raton, Florida.

First Lieutenant Marshal J. McKelvey has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement in aerial combat. Formal presentation of the award was made by Major Martin R. Walsh, Jr., of Youngstown, Ohio, a squadron commander of the 453rd Bomber Group, a unit of Major General William E. Kepner's second bombardment

division. Lt. McKelvey is a bombardier on the B-24 Liberator "Ken-O-Kay." He has made 32 bombing missions over Germany and enemy occupied Europe, including high altitude precision attacks on targets in Berlin, Hamburg, Munich, Stettin, Merseburg and St. Lo. He has the DFC, Lt. McKelvey holds the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters for "meritorious achievement" in aerial combat.

He is the son of Mrs. Park H. McKelvey of 20424 Fremont, Farmington. His wife, Mrs. Dolores R. McKelvey, lives at 5737 Missouri Street, Detroit.

Before securing employment as a tool and die apprentice with the Ford Motor Company, Dearborn, he attended Farmington High School, from which he graduated in 1938. He entered the army in June, 1942, and has been overseas in East Anglia since April, 1944.

Aviation Cadet Gilbert B. Bassler, son of Mrs. Marie Bassler, has just completed the Army's pri-

mary flight training course at Thunderbolt Field No. 1, Glendale, Arizona. He has been in service for two years, and now has 162 hours of flying experience.
