BUS SERVICE
TO BEGIN
ON NORTHWESTERN

W. J. Murray of 28870 Middle-
field Road, has made application
to the Public Service Com-
mission to operate a bus line on
Northwestern Highway, between
Orchard Lake and Wyoming. Ap-
plication is now pending.

The new line, to be known as
the Northwestern Coach Line, will
serve an area not having any other
service. It is planned to begin
operation with two buses, and
more will be added as it becomes
necessary in order to adequately
take care of passengers.

The service would operate hourly
during the early morning hours,
thus enabling people to get to
downtown Detroit in time to begin
their day's work. The bus would
leave Orchard Lake and North-
western right straight through to Wy-
oming, thus making a number of
connections for those who might
wish to transfer to a downtown
line.

It is hoped that the service
will be in operation by March 15,
if the application is granted, and
no unforeseen difficulties arise. A
schedule will be announced later.
