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Potent Drink  
Calvados instead of wine is the beverage of the natives of Normandy and Brittany. Of course the fresh distillate is raw, but after it is properly aged in a wooden cask it is smooth and mellow. The best cider is also aged before it is bottled and stored.

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POISONED BAIT  
WILL GET  
THE CUTWORMS

Planting a victory garden for the cutworms to eat may be doing the worms a favor, but it isn't an easy nor economical method of setting a good table for the family.

Cheating the worms out of their charity meals is a rather simple procedure. Use four ounces of white arsenic, 1 pint of molasses, and one finely chopped lemon or orange, mixed with 6 pounds of bran and enough water to make the mixture stick together when squeezed. Scatter the bait over the garden plot in the late afternoon or early evening. To protect the newly-set plants, bait the garden two or three days before planting.

Another convenient bait mixture is made by using 2 pounds of chopped greens, such as dandelions, and an ounce of sodium fluosulfate, paris green, or white arsenic. Any one of the three poisons also can be used in the bran mixture with equal success.

The cutworms that do the most damage to early spring crops are those that overwinter in the half-grown stage. They become active as warm weather arrives and feed on anything available. If the soil is infested, the damage can be spectacular. Since the worms do not eat fresh vegetation, they cut the plants at night, so that they wish to eat the following night. One worm often harvests as many as a dozen transplants at a time.

PLANT FOOD MAKERS  
HELP FARMERS MEET  
BIG '45 CROP GOALS

CHICAGO—Every American farm acre will have to do a bigger job of producing food in 1945, if world needs for food, fiber and oils are to be met, according to a statement made public here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

"Millions of people throughout the world will depend upon the products of American soil this year than ever before," the statement points out.

"Proper use of fertilizers will contribute more to getting this production than anything else the farmer can do."

The War Food Administration estimates that 20 to 23 per cent of the total crop production in 1944 was due to the use of fertilizer. It would take 50 million acres of land to enable the United States to produce the extra amounts of food that have been added to our national output by the use of plant food.

"In meeting the enormous wartime demands for plant food, the fertilizer industry has established a remarkable record. No other industry—aircraft, shipbuilding or agriculture—has worked harder to deliver the goods in the right quantity and on time. In the face of labor shortages, transportation difficulties and some scarcities of materials, the fertilizer industry has worked day and night to produce the sorely needed plant food for farmers."

"Farmers who themselves have been hampered by shortages of help and equipment can appreciate the problems manufacturers have faced in trying to overcome their difficulties and produce the much-needed plant food."

"In actual tonnage, most producers have been turning out more fertilizer than ever before in history. They have demonstrated by their wartime contribution, that they are ready to meet the conditions which peacetime agriculture will bring. A great soil rebuilding job lies ahead, to replace fertility used up to meet the unprecedented wartime demands for foods, fats and fibers. The fertilizer industry is prepared to do its part in producing all the plant food required for this vast postwar improvement and replenishment job."

Small but Pesky Thrips  
Attack Garden Plants

Thrips attack gladioli, roses, onions and other vegetable crops and ornamental plants. They are a group of insects which are rather tiny in appearance, life history and feeding habits. They are among the most destructive insects that attack home plantings. They are very tiny and usually go unnoticed, although the injury caused by them is very evident to those familiar with it. Some species are provided with wings, while others are wingless. In any case, they rarely exceed 3/32 of an inch in length and have very slender bodies. Where wings occur, they are narrow, membranous and fringed with minute hairs. In most cases they are very active insects, leaping or taking flight with great agility. They are not strong fliers, but are carried considerable distances by the wind.

While most of our insect pests feed either by biting off and devouring bits of the plant tissue, as is the case with caterpillars and beetles, or by piercing the plant tissue and extracting the plant juices, as is the case with aphids and various plant bugs, thrips feed by rasping, scraping or lacerating the plant tissue and then feeding on the oozes from the plant cells. By this method of feeding the thrips destroy relatively large areas of plant tissues. These areas are greatly in excess of the areas actually used for food. For this reason, foliage which has been attacked by thrips has a whitish, blotched appearance.

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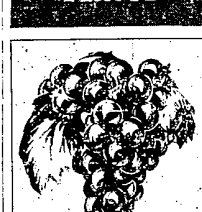
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Poisonous Pasture Plants  
May Cause Animal Deaths

White snakeroot and Jimson weed can be found in many pastures. Both, if eaten in sufficient amounts, cause harmful effects and even death in animals. Water hemlock and poison hemlock, which grow along streams and marshy areas, are considered among the most harmful. In most cases poisoning by these plants occurs in early spring; however, they are believed to be poisonous throughout the growing season. Water parsnip also belongs to this group. Corn cockle and whorled milkweed are particularly abundant along roadsides and in old pastures. Livestock ordinarily will not consume excessive amounts of these plants unless the pasture is poor.

Certain plants produce such fruits as buckeyes, horse-chestnuts, and ground cherries, which have been reported poisonous to domestic animals. Usually livestock avoid these fruits unless forage is scarce. At this time of year castor beans are poisonous to all types of livestock. Following damage by frost, Sudan grass, arrow grass and cherry leaves may form prussic acid and fatally poison farm animals.
