He is a good prospect for pole vault as Milton Knight leaves this year. With these points in mind, the future looks rosy for the track men of Farmington. —T.R.

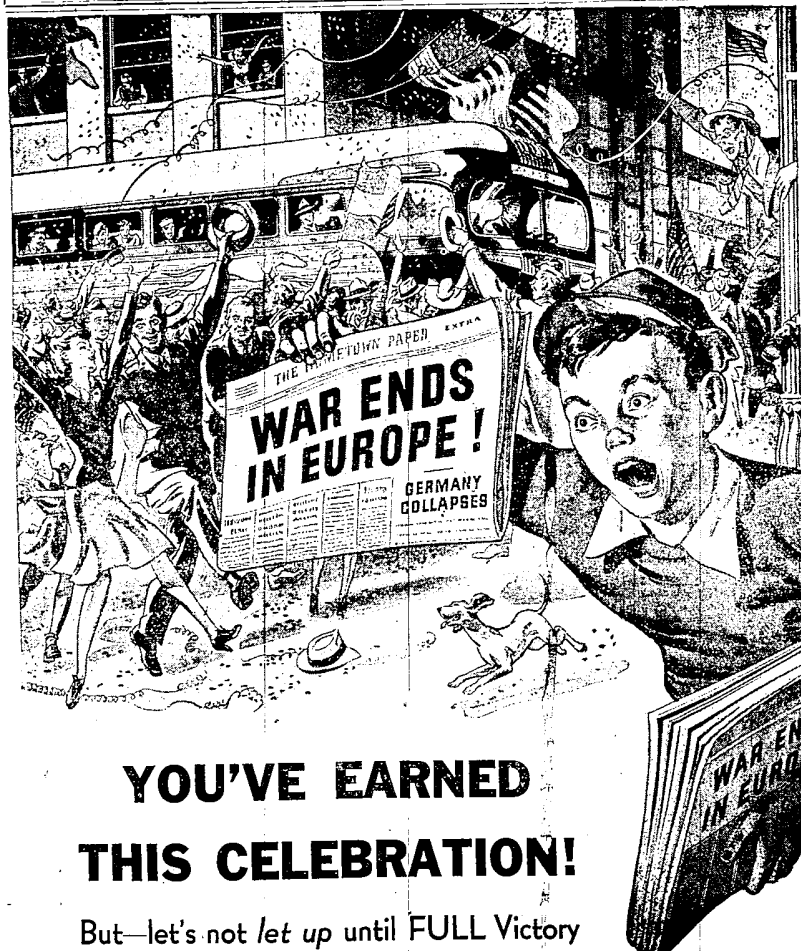
