## EDITORIALS

### Think Before Voting

Judging from the registration of voters in the Farmington Township School District, a record vote will be cast in the June 11 election. The people have indicated their interest in the school through the large registration, and the vote will be representative of the community. The electors choice of a school board member should be accepted by everyone as the choice of the entire community, and the winning candidate may feel that he has the confidence of the entire district.

Before going to the polls next Monday, it is hoped that every voter will carefully consider the qualifications of the two candidates. Know where they stand on school matters, if they are fully acquainted with school problems, and the proper procedure and ethics in school administration. Satisfy yourself that you are casting your vote for the man best fitted to serve the school district, and who will work for the interests of all of the children in the district—and vote for that man on June 11.

### No Strings Attached

From reports now coming back to us, the people on the home front, about a million men in service want to go into business for themselves, and just as quickly as possible after their return home, when complete victory has been achieved. These fellows will give jobs to several million buddies, and other service men will take jobs in other businesses.

Nearly all of our ex-service men will thus depend on the prosperity of businesses, whether their own or not, for their own personal prosperity and livelihood.

Therefore, it is to be hoped that the fad some folks have had of scoffing at business and wanting to soak business with destructive taxes and bureaucratic crackdowns will soon go out of style. Anybody with the initiative and ambition to start, or operate a business should be stimulated—not pestered until they become too discouraged to think the venture worthwhile.

### Keep Your Bonds!

In postwar planning, everybody has to do some thinking about himself. Not even the universities or the banks can be expected to ignore their own survival. Hence it is not surprising to note a recent proposal, made by a personal lending agency association, that owners hang on to their War Bonds at the war's end, and finance their peacetime purchases with borrowed funds.

At first glance you may consider that only a self-interest angle, but after you think about it for a few moments, you'll realize it is good sound logic—and it's patriotic. If everybody cashes his bonds and rushes into the market for an automobile and a hundred other war-restricted accessories, the nation will be in a pretty mess—not to mention the agencies that make a living by discounting installment paper.

On the other hand, if we hoard our bonds and buy what we can from income and personal credit, thus continuing to hold our savings, we will help to prevent inflation, and will retain a backlog that will come in handy for a rainy day, or when we want a long vacation.

**Egg Size Important**  
 Egg size is important in the matter of hatchability. No one wants to breed from birds that take six months to come up to normal egg size and weight. But it is found that pullets that begin to lay 22-ounce eggs may soon arrive at sizes that weigh 27 ounces or more to the dozen. With the smaller breeds of chickens, this would be too large for good hatching. As with most such problems, it's best to run a medium course in selection.

**Treating Fence Posts**  
 Nondurable fence posts, such as the lower grades of yellow pine, can be made relatively durable simply by soaking the basal end in a wooden trough or half a barrel containing a solution of chromated zinc chloride. Steeping the entire post in a tank of soaking both basal and top ends in the solution has also given good protection against termites, fungi, and the destructive organisms that normally attack untreated wood.
