Minutes of the regular meetings held May 9th and May 23, 1945 and special meetings held May 23rd and June 6th, 1945 were read and approved.

Motion made by Hinger and supported by Hatton that the bills presented to the Commission for the month of May, 1945 be paid. Roll Call: Bagnall, Hinger, Hatton, Conroy and Jones. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hatton that the petition of the Warner Dairy Company to change the zoning of certain properties as duly read in the reading of May 23, 1945 and legally advertised in accordance with the zoning ordinance, and that the property owners adjacent to the property were duly notified, that we have the third and final reading. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Conroy that we proceed with the third and final reading with regard to changing of the zoning ordinance which has been legally advertised in accordance with the zoning ordinance and that all property owners adjacent to the property were duly notified of the change from Residence "B" District to Commercial "B" District on the property described as follows: Beginning at the center of Grand River Avenue at a point crossed by an imaginary extension of the west lot line of Lot 11 of Fred M. Warner's Grand River Avenue Subdivision remaining thence from that point in a south-westerly direction and coinciding exactly with the said west lot line of Lot 11 of the said Fred M. Warner's Grand River Avenue Subdivision and extending for a distance of 230 feet from the point of origin; thence in a southeasterly direction parallel to the center of Grand River Avenue as far as the center of Powers Avenue; thence north on the center of Powers Avenue to the center of Grand River Avenue; thence in a north-westerly direction to the center of Grand River Avenue to the point of origin. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that the tax rate for 1945 and 1946 be \$15.00 per thousand and that the annual City Budget for 1945 and 1946 in the amount of \$48,143.00 be adopted. Roll Call: Bagnall, Hinger, Hatton, Jones and Conroy.

Motion made by Hinger and supported by Conroy that the Forty and Eight Club of the Amman Legion be given permission to hold a "Tag Day" on Saturday, June 23, 1945 in the City of Farmington. This money is to be used for procuring playing cards for the servicemen. Carried, all yeas.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that meeting be adjourned. Carried, all yeas.
