



Plant in Postwar Era Plant in Postwar Era Mikweed seed off has potential before the control of the co

agricultural economy after the war, it is pointed out.

Prior to the war little attention was given to the commercial value of milkweed floss and the oil from the seeds, and the oil from the seeds, and the overalle economic and agricultural picture was not favorable for the establishment of any significant milkweed industry in this country, the report declares. However, as a result of the stoppage of kapok imports from the East Indies, the seed hair of milkweed floss has become of great technical importance, and recent tests have indicated its superiority over Kapok.

Although the plant is perennial and grows wild in many sections of the United States and Canada, large amount is being cultivated to satisfy the great definand for the floss. The plant is hardy and requires little attention after the first part of cultivation, and its growth is valuable in preventing soil ecosion.
