Corn as the Cob

I have been astonished that corn
make up a much smaller proportion
and grow a much larger per-
centage of the crop when corn is
grown on properly fertilized land.
At the Illinois experimental field of the
Illinois college of agriculture, corn
grown on soil fertilized with nitro-
gen, phosphorus, potassium and cal-
cium contained 15 per cent or 10.5
pounds of cob per 70-pound bushel
of ear-corn; while the same hybrid
from unfertilized land on this field
contained 20 per cent or 14 pounds
of cob per bushel of ear-corn. This
means that each 100 bushels of ear-
corn grown on this unfertilized land
contained 350 pounds more cob than
100 bushels grown on treated land.

Cuts Milk Output

Shortage of vitamin D in dairy
cattle results in lower milk produc-
tion, stiffness, and may be a cause
of milk fever. In any young grow-
ing animal it appears as enlarged
joints, particularly knee and hock,
crooked legs, poor appetite, and thin-
ness. In brood sows it usually re-
sults in paralysis of the hind quar-
ters. The sow usually dies of this,
but if the pigs are born they ordin-
arily are dead or weak, and the
sow produces little or no milk. Diet
sunshine supplies vitamin D.

Removing Spots

When cleaning a garment at home
plump up the spot well with a pad
of unexcelled or white blotting pa-
per. Work with the spotted side
next to the pad so that the liquid
will carry the stain out, not through
the material. The padding will ab-
sorb the fluid carrying the spot.

Indians Use Blowguns
Blowguns with poisoned darts are
by no means exclusive to the
Orient. Indian tribes of Ecuador
more than 12 feet long. They use
darts up to 18 inches with the points
dipped in juice of the native strychnine
fruit to bag large game, and
sun-baked balls of clay for small
game. When the troglodytes
roamed the region of Upper New
York state in the pre-Colonial times,
blowguns were among their weap-
ons.

First Vet Benefit
The first national law for veter-
ans' benefits was passed by the Con-
gress in 1776. By this act
veterans were promised help pay
in case of disability sufficient to in-
terfere with earning a livelihood.
Since no federal funds were avail-
able at the time, this law acted
only as a recommendation to individ-
ual states. However, a United
States congressional act of 1789 took
over all state-paid pensions as a national
responsibility.

Metal That Never Tires
As a substitute for war-scare tin,
beryllium with copper and with other
metals forms hard, extremely
strong alloys for tools and dies. Be-
cause it gives out sparks, it makes
good safety tools and surfaces for
workers in factories handling ex-
plosives. Outstanding is beryllium's use
in aircraft instruments. A combina-
tion of 2 per cent beryllium and 98
per cent copper in precision springs
has the virtue of not weakening, no
matter how often the springs may
be stretched. Hence beryllium's rep-
utation as "the metal that never
tires."

A good colony of bees gathers
about 65 pounds of pollen every
year, says department of agriculture
scientists. And to gather one pound
of pollen, bees must visit one hive
visit over eight million flowers. That
makes 523 million flowers visited by
bees from a normal beehive every
year. Entomologists say that the
honeybee is responsible for 80 per
cent of all pollination, but that to
take care of the pollination require-
ment of our enormous acreage of
fruit and seed crops, more bees are
needed, particularly to increase
legume seed production.
