### Our Shopping Center

In our series of editorial comments, we should like to consider Farmington's shopping center, not just as it is today, but as it will be.

We hope you will agree, that one of the biggest assets this community can have is a modern, complete shopping center. No community can be a home center - which Farmington is - unless there is also a shopping center, to serve the residents of those homes. This of course, must be substantiated by an excellent school system, centrally located, and with well planned city services.

There is much to be said in favor of a shopping center, with individual enterprises rather closely grouped, so that the various business houses and of rices are not too widely spread apart. This does not mean that the stores should be spaced as closely tosufficient room allowed for parking facilities and accommodations. It is advisable, however, to have the stores close enough for shoppers to be able to walk from one place to another. gether as in metropolitan areas, for there must be from one place to another. These should be a part of the shopping center.

Farmington must strive to create the best public impression possible, for the first opinions one forms of a new community are quite often the ones that one will keep. Good planning and beautification of the community are the best salesmen with which to meet prospective home owners. If we wish to attract people to Farmington, and create in them a desire to make this their home, we should have excellent facilities and appeal that will make them feel this is the one city in which they want to live.

We should like to again state that it is not our intention or objective to assume the responsibility of planning, or to dictate the details, but merely to point to the need.
