Judging will start at 8:30 a.m. and wind up late in the afternoon. Admission is \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for children under 12.

Among the competitors will be Michael Heck of Livonia and his Shetland sheepdog, Lindhurst Enchanting Lass; and Carol Lamb of Plymouth and her two Shetland sheepdogs, Car-a-Lam's Wild Flower and Dar-a-Lam's Temptation.

Dogs are coming from as far away as Maine and California for the show. They are as small as papillons and as large as German shepherds and terriers. There will be 150 dogs in the show.

NICHOLAS AND ALEXANDRA - The story of the Russian court before its downfall is told in the grand style. Runs three hours. (GP, A-2)

THE FRENCH CONNECTION - The fight against heroin smuggling on a large scale makes an exciting, realistic detective movie. With Gene Hackman. (R, A-4)

PLAY MISTY FOR ME - Clint Eastwood is both director and star of this chiller about what happens when a dice jockey meets a psychotic fan. (R, A-4)

THE HOSPITAL - George C. Scott and Diana Rigg star in this comedy about a plot to use the hospital system to commit several murders. (GP, A-3)

THEY CALL ME TRINITY - A spoof on Westerns starring Terence Hill as the dirtiest, laziest gun in the west, and Stanley Kramer as an evil rancher. (G, A-3)
