BIBLE QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY THE VOICE OF PROPHECY INTERNATIONAL BIBLE SEMINAR

Question—Please explain the "fig tree" in Matthew 24:32.

Answer—Let us read it: "Now learn a parable of the fig tree: When his branch is yet tender, and putteth forth leaves, ye know that summer is nigh." In Luke 21:29 it is written: "And He spake to them a parable: Behold the fig tree, and all the trees." The green leaves on the fig tree and all the trees are a sign of summer. So the signs which Christ has given are evidences of the coming kingdom of God.

Q.—What is the meaning of "Jehovah-shalom," and where is it found in the Bible?
A.—It is in Exodus 17:15 and means "The Lord is my banner." This name was given by Moses to the altar built in commemoration of the victory over the Amalekites, Exodus 17:15.

Q.—How could Moses write laws when, according to authorities, men were not yet civilized enough to write, much less make laws?

A.—What authorities? Such an idea might have been published one hundred years ago, but modern archaeology has proved a state of high civilization in the days of Moses. In 1901 Dr. Morgan discovered carved on a great obelisk the famous code of laws of Hammurabi, a king who lived hundreds of years before Moses. So modern discoveries prove the Bible true.

Q.—What was the mark put upon Cain?

A.—Read Genesis 4:14, 15. The original words, literally rendered, are: "The Lord gave a sign, a token, a pledge, to Cain, that no one who found him should kill him." That is, God assured him of his personal safety. Just what that sign or token was, we are not told.

Q.—All do not have the same environment and heritage, so how can God hold them equally responsible in the judgment?

A.—In God's record of a man's life, his birthplace, etc., are taken into consideration. Psalm 67:46: "I will make mention of Ishmael and Babylon to them that know Me: behold Philistia, and Tyre, with Ethiopia: this man was born there. And of Zion it shall be said, This and that man was born in her: and the Highest Himself shall establish her. The Lord shall count, when He writeth up the people, that this man was born there."

NEW CANNED FOODS WILL SOON APPEAR

Now that the postwar era has become a reality with the downfall of Japan, citizens of Oakland County can look forward to dramatic developments in canned foods, many of which were first packaged for the armed forces, according to W. C. Stolk, vice-president of the American Can Company.

Mr. Stolk said that the approximately 22,637,000 cans of food opened annually by residents of the county undoubtedly will be largely increased with the arrival of the new postwar items. It will be no trick at all, he said, for a housekeeper to put together a three or four course meal by making use of the canned foods she should shortly find on grocery shelves.

Among the new foods he listed are such items as canned ham, burgers, canned bacon, seafood cocktails and salads in cans, as well as a long list of meats new to a can, among them chicken stew with dumplings, beef and gravy, pork with apple sauce, ham with raisin sauce and baked turkey.

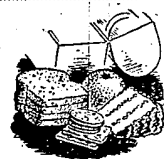
