Cut The Taxes

And now we are getting the news that they are planning to cut income taxes. It does seem as though they could cut them more than they are talking of doing.

We are well acquainted with the claim that the government is going to need a lot of money to carry on the nation's affairs, particularly if there are not jobs to go around. That seems to be going at the task backwards, however. There would certainly be a lot more jobs if people could pay less taxes, and thus have more money to put into building up their own business.

Until just a short time ago none of us had ever heard the term, "carry home pay", but now if you should ask the working man how much he makes, back comes the reply that his "carry home" pay is so much—that is what he figures on, not on how much is actually credited to him by his employer. If, through reduction of taxes, his "carry home" pay could be increased, there would not be so much concern and strife over an increase in the rate of wages per hour.

In private enterprise one finds the same condition existing. Many a veteran is returning, intent upon going into business for himself. Perhaps he has been out of the service but a very short time, and he is having a real struggle to get started. If he could spend the money which he receives as his profit for some new equipment, or for improving his service or merchandise, instead of for taxes, not only his own business, but business in general would take a definite turn for the better.

Why go on robbing Peter to pay Paul? Our Congressmen should certainly be able to hit upon a better solution to the problem than has yet been designed.

Dyeing Printed Fabrics
Dyeing printed fabrics is feasible and often produces highly desirable color effects. The print design—which cannot be removed—will show through even when dyed black. The resultant effect will depend upon the fabric and strength of the dye solution. Frequently a striking two-tone effect is produced. It is suggested that a darker dye color be employed on prints.

Mineral Absorption
Scientists studying perosis, a bone disease in poultry due to a deficiency of manganese in food, found that if calcium or phosphorus is added to a diet, normally sufficient in manganese, the chickens developed perosis. This was due to an absorption of manganese by calcium phosphate which put the manganese in a form which the body could not use.

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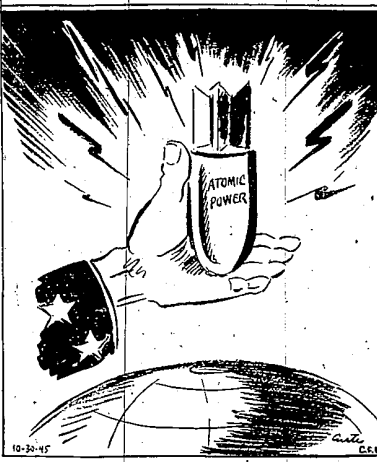
