VINCENT SHEEAN WILL GIVE PEACE RULES

Speaking on "How To Keep The Peace," Vincent Sheean, famous author and foreign correspondent, will appear at Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theatre, Wednesday morning, November 7, at eleven o'clock.

The distinguished writer is internationally known both as a literary man of top rank, and as a speaker of great originality. His books, "Not Peace But A Sword," and "Personal History" were among the best-sellers; his broadcasts three times weekly from Europe over the Blue Network won a large radio following.

Sheean covered the news on the western front as an accredited correspondent with General Patton's Army. Before that, assignments for the Chicago Tribune and Daily News took the newsman to Italy, Germany, and Spain, then to Austria. Just at the time Hitler started his long prepared eastward expansion. In May 1942, the author was commissioned a Captain in the United States Army as a member of Air-Intelligence. He sailed with the "Torch" expedition to North Africa, landing in Morocco on November 8, D-Day. Married to the former Diana Forbes Robertson, daughter of the well known actors, Sir Johnston and Lady Forbes, Sheean lives in New York when not on tour, with his wife and two young daughters. BIBLE QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY THE VOICE OF PROPHECY INTERNATIONAL BIBLE BROADCASTER

Question—In what year did Wycliffe translate the Bible and print it in the English language?
Answer—He translated the New Testament about 1380 and wrote a copy by hand. There were no printing presses in Europe then.

Q—Why is the Spirit of God revealed only in the New Testament?

A—The Spirit of God is a subject of Old Testament revelation also. For example, in the first chapter of the Bible it is written, "And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters"; and in Isaiah 63:19, "When the enemy shall come in like a flood, the Spirit of the Lord shall lift up a standard against him."

Q—Does the Bible teach that all mankind will ever be united in one body?

A—Yes, after the millennium, when the redeemed of all nations will live on the earth made new. "Who shall not fear Thee, O Lord, and glorify Thy name? for Thou only art holy: for all nations shall come and worship before Thee: for Thy judgments are made manifest." Revelation 15:4. "And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear My voice: and there shall be one fold, and one shepherd." John 10:16.

GET THE MOST GOOD FROM LEFTOVER FAT

Clarifying leftover fat, to use at home or to turn in for salvage, is easy if we follow our grandmother's method, says Mary Woodward, home agent of Oakland County.

All solid or lump fat (suet or chicken fat) should be rendered out in a frying pan over a low heat, or in a 300 degree F. oven. It is then ready to use "as is" for cooking.

But the problem of what to do with the few drops of bacon fat, or the quarter cup of grease left from frying fish, is the most puzzling. Try, or used it for frying.

ing. Miss Woodward advises placing all the fat in a kettle. Cover with cold water and boil 10 or 15 minutes. Let set until cold, and a circle of fat will rise to the top of the water and most of the burned particles will be on the bottom of the kettle. If the fat still needs more clarifying, remove it, melt and strain through a double piece of cheesecloth or clean, old scrim curtains. As a last resort, if further clarifying is still needed, heat the fat and fry a few pieces of potato in it. Grandmother did all this to her accumulated fat and then made it into delectable cookies and pastries from frying fish, is the most puzzling. Try, or used it for frying.

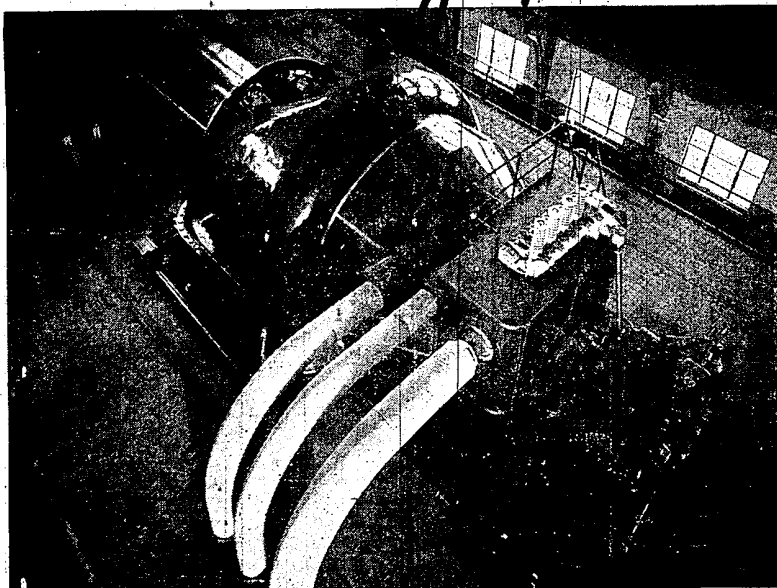
