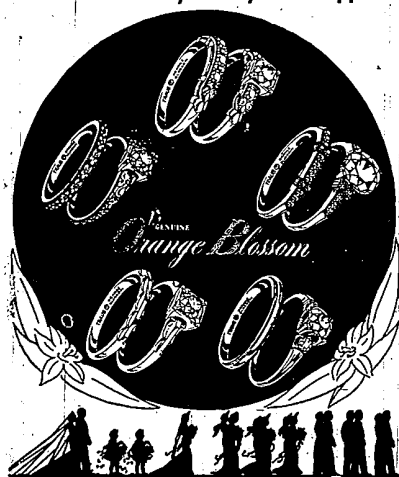

Meeting called to order by Mayor Hamlin at 8:25 p.m.

Minutes of the regular meeting held October 10th, 1945 were read and approved.

Motion made by Conroy and supported by Nacker that the bills presented to the Commission for the month of October, 1945, be paid. Roll Call: Nacker, Bagnall, Hinger, Hatton and Conroy. Carried, all years.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that the proposed amendments to Sections 263, 265 and 220 of the Zoning Ordinance to read as follows:

Sec. 263: In a Commercial A District a motor supply station may be permitted by the Board of Appeals under the conditions specified herein only after a public hearing as specified in Sections 46a and 46b.

Sec. 265: In a Commercial B District a service garage or a motor supply station may be permitted by approval of the Board of Appeals.

Sec. 220: Front yards are not required in any Commercial District except as provided otherwise by the terms of this Ordinance, but, nothing herein shall be construed as prohibiting them; Provided, that single dwellings hereafter erected on any lot within a Commercial A District or a Commercial B District shall observe and conform to the regulations for front yards required in a Residence A District or a Residence B District in accordance with the total lot area specified elsewhere in this Ordinance, for single family dwellings in Residence A Districts and/or Residence B Districts, respectively; Provided Further, that where there is a front yard ten (10) feet or less, or where any part of the front building line is ten (10) feet or less from the front line the entire front building line shall be parallel to the street line.

be passed in accordance with the ordinance and that this reading be considered the first and second reading. Carried, all years.

Motion made by Hatton and supported by Conroy that the petition of the Fred M. Warner Estate presented by Howard M. Warner, Trustee, to change the zoning of certain property as duly read in the reading of October 10th, 1945 and legally advertised in accordance with the Zoning Ordinance, and that the property owners adjacent to the property were duly notified that we have the third and final reading. Carried, all years.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Hinger that we proceed with the third and final reading with regard to changing of the Zoning Ordinance which has been legally advertised in accordance with the Zoning Ordinance and that all property owners adjacent to the property were duly notified of the change from that portion zoned "Suburban" to Commercial "B" on the property described as follows:

1. That said estate is the owner of premises located in the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan described as: A triangle parcel of land being that portion of the S.W. 1/4 Sec. 27, T1N, R9E, Oakland County, lying southerly of U.S. Highway 16 (Grand River Cut Off) and bounded on the west by west Sec. line of Sec. 27 or Farmington Road and on the south Sec. line of Sec. 27 or the Nine Mile Road.

2. That part of the above described premises are designated on the zoning map as zoned to "Commercial B" area and the greater portion zoned to "Suburban".

3. That because of the location and the use of that part of the premises designated as "Commercial B" to which it has been put—namely a gasoline service station, the said entire premises may be best used as a "Commercial B District".

4. That it is proposed to use part of the premises as a commercial garage, automobile and truck agency together with a gasoline station and accessory store.

5. That for the reason that your petitioner owns the premises immediately north of the property in question and a majority of the remainder of the adjoining property being outside the City limits and the further reason of the peculiar shape of the parcel, it is deemed for the best interests of all to designate the entire parcel first above described as a Commercial "B" District.

Carried, all years.

Motion made by Nacker and supported by Conroy that a street light be installed on Brookdale at the corner of Nine Mile Road in the City of Farmington. Carried, all years.

Motion made by Hinger and supported by Nacker that the City Clerk be instructed to write the State Highway Department at Lansing requesting the replacement of a traffic signal at the intersection of U.S. 16 Cut-Off and Farmington Road. Carried, all years.

Motion made by Hatton and supported by Conroy that \$15,000.00 be taken from the General Fund Reserve and placed in the Street Repair Fund under General Fund to take care of street repairs. Carried, all years.

Motion made by Hatton and supported by Hinger that the City Commission approve payment to the Detroit Concrete Products Corporation of Item No. 2 in the amount of \$9,020.66. Carried, all years.

Motion made by Nacker and supported by Hinger that the meeting be adjourned. Carried, all years.
