



An interesting thing is happening in fashions. There are fashions for kids and there are fashions for adults this spring. People can once again look their age without fear of being out of it. All ages are in

According to the 1970 census, most Americans are over 25 years old. (The median age in Oakland county is 26, in Wayne county, 28.) Youth worship is fading and as the country's biggest population block - all those post-war babies - moves into its late 20s the image of Mr. and (Miss, Mrs., Ms.?) Superchic has lost its babyfat and shows a few wrinkles.

Designers spring fashions, those who cater to the established monied crowd, both male and female, project the image a mature, modern person.

Designers have been trying to do this for over a year, rummaging through the apparel of the 40s and 50s, dusting off padded shoulders, midi-skirts, seamed nylons and red lipstick for women and costuming men to look like an Edwardian courtier, Hollywood gangster or the Red Baron.

Young people who didn't want to look like the stars of the late night movies clung to their miniskirts, bell-bottoms and levis. Then there was counter-culture garb. gleaned from Army surplus stores. anything that looked like it had been worn "by the people" for at least three generations.

Hot pants were a welcome relief last spring. Youthful, exciting, they drew almost the same reaction from conservative employers as the mini did several years be-

Several simple, tasteful and well accepted styles emerged in fall fashions. The knee length skirt looks good on most women and the mini is still around for those who can wear it. Men's clothes, which had broken out in a pox of colors and ruffles, began to settle

Spring fashions on the whole are contemporary designs, rather than period costumes. The best of them combine versions of the time honored suit, coat, dress and pant styles with elements of the more successful youth fads.

Denim, for example, the badge of the worker adopted by the radicals as the badge of the revolution, has been copted by businessmen. The businessman's denim is the stretch, brushed variety often dyed a patriotic red, white or blue or an ecological earth color.

The impossible-to-wear-a-brawith halter dress, available in any boutique last year, was one of the dominant items in the Paris coutour collections this spring.

There are a number of extreme styles on the market like Ferraud's four-inch high heels for women and a white jumpsuit-with-tailstuxedo for men (which led its model to quip, "I feel like an al-bino penguin"). But for the most part men's and women's spring styles seem to concentrate on simplicity and comfort.
