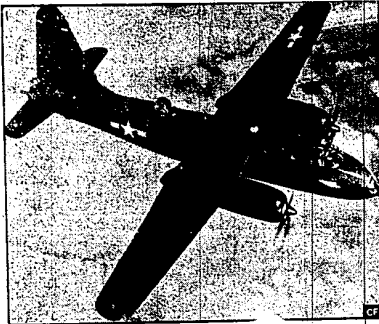


# NEW SKY GUARDIAN OF OUR NAVY

## "SEIZED CRADLE OF THE PEOPLE"



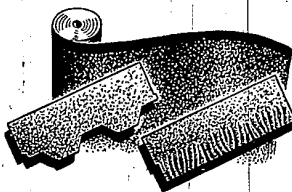

The incident is no help to already strained Russo-Turkish relations which have been deteriorating since last March when the Soviet denounced a 20-year-old treaty of friendship and non-aggression.

Mixing insecticides. Keep children and pets away when mixing insecticides and wash all utensils thoroughly and promptly after mixing. In both mixing and using sprays and dusts, take great care to keep them out of mouth, eyes and nose, and also away from the skin as much as possible. Shorts and sun-suits are not suitable wear for these jobs because they leave so much skin exposed. After handling and using insecticides wash hands and face thoroughly. Garments worn when spraying and dusting should be washed frequently. Bags and packages which have held insect powders should be burned out in the open air and empty cans and any leftover insecticides should be buried at least a foot in the ground.

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## Simple Methods Check Ravages of Tiny Moth

Of all household pests, the most devastating is the delicate little moth. Each year it is responsible for millions of dollars worth of damage to fabrics and furs. Last summer was a record season for such losses. Yet homemakers can bring this damage down to almost zero by simple methods: cleanliness, the use of preventive chemicals, and the proper packing and storage of woolen garments while not in use.

The need for preventive treatment is greater now than ever before. Ruin of a single garment may not seem a disaster to the person who has money to replace it, but it becomes a serious matter when every additional yard of fabric requires vital raw materials and more manpower.

Whenever possible, garments subject to moth damage should be washed before storing to rid them of the soil, spots, and grease which are so attractive to the moth.

Woolen and other articles that cannot go into the wash should be dry-cleaned or should at least be brushed thoroughly to remove dirt from pockets, seams, folds and hems, and should be hung in the sun for several hours. They should then be treated with a moth preventive and placed in a clean, absolutely airtight container or wrapped tightly in clean news papers.

Balsam of Peru Used Widely in Medicine

Besides serving as a base for perfumes, balsam of Peru has many varied uses in the medical field. Both its internal and external use are important. In the treatment of wounds, this Salvadoran product has had the most notable effects. It is said that the first preparation of balsam was invented by Don Jose Fustagui de Leon of Guatemala but, only a few years ago, several European, among which were Dr. Dumont and Dr. Suter discovered its application in connection with the dressing of wounds. Their process consists merely of dressing the wound with balsam and then covering it with a sterilized bandage. Word has been received from first-aid stations in battlefronts all over the world.

The war has placed balsam of Peru in the front lines of the battle against pain and infection.

Wash Job. Scientists, who have studied the washday job suggest "washing" loads of clothes, rather than lifting and carrying them in the laundry and to the line. A bench or box fitted with casters will hold the basket, hamper or tub in the laundry or outdoors. Other suggestions are that one stand erect at work, sort clothes on a table instead of the floor and place blocks of wood under legs of the washing machine or wash bench to bring it to the most comfortable height. This will save one-third of the energy required to put them in a draw cord so as to hang in the most convenient place or to be sewed onto a clothes hanger and slipped along the line across steps.

A clothes line should be about 6 feet high for the average woman and should be tight, to save "stretch" in hanging out clothes.

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## Root Vegetables Keep Well in Basement

Having fresh vegetables to serve the year around on the table—those raised during the summer in the home garden or in a cold storage bin. Proper storage space is all that is necessary. Root crops, such as beets, carrots, turnips, rutabagas, salsify, parsnips and winter radishes, also late varieties of cabbages and potatoes, may be stored in the basement.

In a house heated with a furnace, a satisfactory storage room can be built by partitioning off a section of the basement, preferably in a corner where a casement window can be used for ventilation and control of storage temperature. Both outside and inside walls, as well as ceiling and door, should be covered with insulation board, and a fill-type or blanket insulation should be put on the ceiling to prevent heat penetration. For the floor, use moist sand covered with a slatted framework.

Ventilation can be provided in the storage room by removing a window sash and inserting a cold air duct, with outlet near the floor. This duct should have a damper that will permit easy control of the ventilation and temperature. It is also wise to provide an outlet for warm air by replacing another pane in the window with a small door. These openings should be screened to keep insects and rodents out. During the remaining portions of the winter, as light will damage the vegetables.

Women Face Tough Fight in U. S. Politics

When suffragists chained themselves to the White House fence to the day and annoyance of William Howard Taft and Woodrow Wilson, their battle cry was for women's rights. They proposed "a woman's touch" to the legislative halls and to end the making of laws in an atmosphere permeated by the "lunacy" of Pittsburgh step-mothers.

Today only nine women sit in congress—about 1 1/2 per cent of congressional membership—and on a census basis there should be more than 200 members.

And yet, large, the influence in congress of the "gentlewomen" is much greater than would be expected from their numbers. Their biggest fight is to get a "woman's touch" to the legislative halls.

From the local organization, for few women are trying to move up the ladder from precinct to ward, to city, to legislature, and finally, to congress, has women said that congress has been much more able and energetic than a man to break into congress.

Main Jap Island. Honshu, or Main-isle, the name is literally translated—is the largest and most populous of Japan's home islands. Besides its capital centers, Honshu holds the largest and only extensive plain of Japan proper, a productive area highly important in this mountainous hard-to-cultivate country.

Like the rest of Japan, Honshu has considerable resources in timber. It produces some copper, gold, iron pyrites, coal and a little petroleum, as well as small quantities of iron. Its mountain streams provide hydroelectric power on which much of the modern industry has been based.

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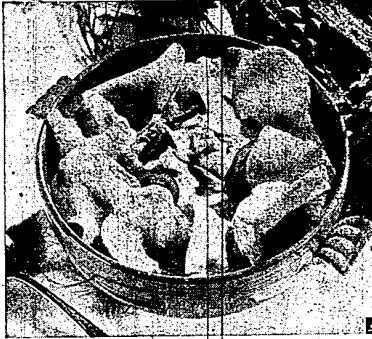
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## Chicken-Potato Chip Scallop Is Ideal For Buffet Suppers



Next time you entertain plan to have a buffet supper and serve chicken and potato chip scallop as the main dish. This delicious casserole is easy to prepare, easy to serve, and is most fitting looking with its garnish of whole potato chips.

Here is a suggested menu:

Keep this recipe handy, too, as a grand way of using up left-over chicken or turkey. The flavor blends with almost any kind of vegetable and a salad of either fruit or tossed greens is equally good.

Chicken-Potato Chip Scallop 2 cups coarsely crushed potato chips 1 cup milk 4 tablespoons butter or margarine 1/2 cup grated American cheese 1 tablespoon minced onion Salt and pepper to taste 1/2 cup cubed chicken Potato chips for garnishing 4 tablespoons flour

Melt the butter or margarine in a heavy saucepan. Add the green pepper, onion and mushrooms and cook until onion is yellow. Add the flour and blend. Add chicken stock and milk (all milk may be used if desired) and cook and stir until smooth and thickened. Add cheese and stir until melted. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Arrange one cup of the crushed potato chips in bottom of a casserole dish. Arrange one cup of cubed chicken over chips, top with half of the sauce mixture. Repeat layers. Garnish top with whole potato chips. Bake for 25 minutes in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, or until thoroughly heated and lightly browned. This makes six servings.
