

## On Capitol Hill

News and Comments from Congressman George A. Dondero

Progress Of Army Demobilization

Data given to Congressman George A. Dondero by Col. William F. Pearson, War Department Liaison Officer for the U. S. House of Representatives, indicates that more than one-half of the personnel of the Army at its peak strength on V-E Day was demobilized by January 1, 1946. In the period May 12 to November 30, 1945, 3,634,000 were released from the Army.

Since V-E Day, 15,469 doctors, 5,539 dentists and 23,615 nurses have been returned to civil life by the Army. An additional group of 15,000 physicians and 5,000 dentists were made eligible for release by new eligibility standards announced by the War Department on November 30, 1945. With the additional group thus made eligible two-thirds of the doctors in the Army as of V-E Day and more than one-half of the dentists will be eligible to resume their civilian practice.

### UNRRA BILL Approved

The U. S. House of Representatives, by a vote of 327 to 39, recently approved the UNRRA bill. Rep. George A. Dondero was among those voting for the legislation. Speaking on the floor of the House he said:

"On three previous occasions I have voted for UNRRA; first, for confirming the agreement and then twice for the commitments we made. I intend to support this bill. However, a serious question has been raised here today, and an argument has been lodged against it, whether or not we should attach the amendment offered by the gentleman from Ohio (Mr. Brown). The argument lodged against it has been made by the gentleman from South Carolina (Mr. Richards). I can very well understand that to attach a condition to a contract is a dangerous thing to do after that contract is made, especially when one party to that contract seeks to attach that condition alone. May I observe, however, that if this bill passes without the amendment being attached regarding a free press, it seems to me the obligation and the responsibility will be upon those nations which receive aid or administer the relief we intend to see to it that the American people, who are providing 72 per cent of the relief, be given all the news and all the facts in reference to the administration and distribution of the relief we provide in this bill.

"I now want to ask a question. There has come to me some information this afternoon that Italy has received about \$30,000,000 under UNRRA for expectant mothers and children. We find no fault with that. Further, this information is to the effect that there is some agreement pending, perhaps secret, that Italy is to receive \$450,000,000 more from UNRRA — and I do not complain with that — but I rise to ask if at the same time that we grant UNRRA relief to Italy it is true that Russia is demanding reparations from Italy? Is there anyone on the committee who can answer that question?"

The Joint Committee on Reduction of Nonessential Federal Expenditures.

Harry P. Byrd, reports that there were 3,619,769 Federal employees in August, the time of the surrender of Japan. The latest available report of the committee shows that there are still 3,377,676 employees, a very negligible decrease. It is obvious, on the basis of these figures, that the administration is not anxious to detach payroll and the time is at hand when steps should be taken to force the administration to put the Executive branch of the government on a peacetime basis as soon as possible.
