CHRISTIANITY WILL COUNTERACT INDIFFERENCE

Militant postwar Christianity to counteract spiritual indifference was advocated today by Dr. Walter A. Malar in his weekly broadcast over the international Lutheran Hour. Declaring that the Church today has too often become soft, luxurious, easy, a pleasant thing with "rose windows, sweet-scented incense, pretty colors, dreamy music, lofty Gothic architecture, and men's souls are dying and masses in America are turning to practical atheism, he deplored the half-empty and spiritually anemic churches that slumber on in self-sufficiency with America confronted by the first of its postwar crisis.

At times at the soft but selfish life of many Americans, he contrasted the selling of fur coats for dogs with the fatal need of food and clothing among many war sufferers. He declared: "A made-to-measure milk coat is offered at \$24.95, while across the ocean Europe is filled with half-starved, freezing children who have no shoes or stockings, only burlap to cover their feet, no underclothes, only dirty newspapers, no warm coats and jackets, only thin, dirty, discolored rag which Victory clothing officials say 'we would use for mops; Caracul, Persian lamb, silver fox, mink, ermine coats for American dogs, but as yet not even an old, discarded coat for Germany's dying children who certainly are not responsible for the evils of nazism. Did we fight the war to create a society in which poodle dogs are protected against cold winds by tailor-made fur ensemble while innocent children slowly freeze to death? Did we spend more than \$300,000,000 for purposes of blood-shed to help make a world in which dead dogs are laid into expensive caskets, buried in exclusive canine cemeteries, and honored with costly monuments, while in war-wrecked nations dead men and women are placed into shallow graves on Potter's Field without casket, without even a small wooden cross to give their name?"

As today we see only the beginning of a tremendous postwar struggle between Christ and chaos, to the faith and truth of Jesus or the fang and tooth of the jungle, we should recognize personally and powerfully that the enduring hope and the promise of real peace for ourselves, our souls, our families, our country, our world lies not primarily in any human arrangements, atomic energy control, labor boards, United Nations, but in that power which short-sighted men neglect, misunderstand, oppose, even curse and seek to destroy; faith in Jesus Christ, God's Son and the world's Savior.

Blood-Building Food
The No. 1 food on the blood-building list is liver. The first session of an international community class in New Testament was conducted last Monday evening, January 21, at the Northville Baptist Church. Instructor of the class is the Rev. Fred B. Fisher, pastor of Farmington's First Baptist Church. The course will continue every Monday night from 8 to 9 o'clock until April 8. Registrations for the first session totaled fifty. All who are interested may enroll.

The nature of the course will be a survey study of the entire New Testament, coinciding with a week's Bible Conference, April 15 to 19, either at Farmington or Northville, at which time an eminent guest Bible teacher will lecture on the Book of Revelation.
