If you think it's a thrill to pass a car on a blind hill or curve — just pull up along side a crushed car that tried the same thing. The occupants of that car found a new thrill, and if they are alive they will tell you they don't like it.

Auto accidents are not pretty — they have a way of slowing you down — they have a way of making you think. But like these words, they are soon tossed away and forgotten. That's why every week end Michigan residents die.

That's why, if you want to live — you want to remember.

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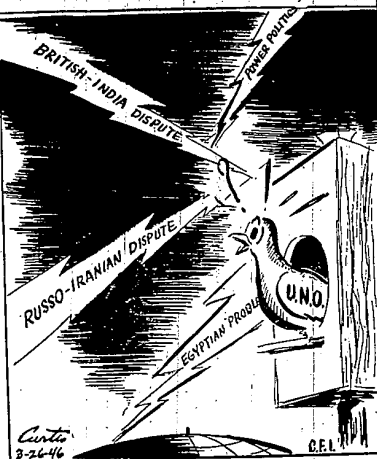
