County Insurance
Benefits Listed

Figures reported today by Jack
D. Glutz, acting manager of the
Pontiac office of the Social Se-
curity Board, show that a total of
\$115,743.63 is being paid monthly
in insurance benefits to 5,701 peo-
ple in the two counties of this
area by the Federal system of old-
age and survivors insurance.
These figures are for March 31,
1946, as disclosed in a report for
the first quarter of this year and
show a decrease of approximately
14.2 per cent over the benefit
payments made in the previous
quarter.

Of these Social Security bene-
ficiaries 33.1 per cent are retired
workers, aged 65 or more, who
numbered 1,888 on March 31, 1946
with payments totaling \$51,547.12
a month. The remainder includes
wives — over 65 — of retired
workers, widows over 65 of re-
tired workers who have died, wi-
dows (of any age) with children
under 18, these children and in
some cases parents of deceased
workers.

The following figures show the
number of persons in each group
who are receiving Social Security
benefits in Oakland and Macomb
counties and the total of the
monthly payments:

Retired workers 1,888, \$51,547.12.
Widows over 65, 627, \$3,787.07.
Widows over 65, 285, 6,052.32.
Widows, with children, 775,
\$14,457.96.
Children, 2111, \$31,691.10.
Aged dependent parents, 15,
\$208.06.

In addition to these monthly in-
surance payments, a total of \$23,
552.04 was paid during the quar-
ter in lump-sum payments. With
the announcement of these figures

Mr. Glutz pointed out that it is
advisable for workers of 65 or
more to call at the Social Security
Building for information, whether
or not they are still working. Even
if a worker is not planning to re-
tire, he added, it may be to his
advantage to file an application
for Social Security benefits un-
der a procedure that has been ar-
ranged to prevent possible loss of
benefit payments.

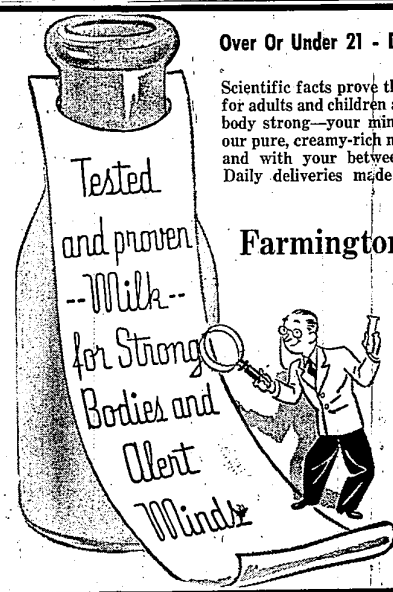
