Out of the rapidly growing number of Chinese women who insist on education and a chance to earn their own living comes Helena Kuo. Her ambition to make something of herself not only for the sake of her personal happiness, but also for China and her sex, motivates a life-story that is both inspiring and dramatic. Miss Kuo traced her own development as she passes from the influence of her noble father and a traditional mother to the independent life of a student. After her schooling she joined the staff of a newspaper in Shanghai only to flee from the Japanese in 1937. Fortunately, she was offered an opportunity to become an ambassador of good-will to England, and so she journeyed there. In 1939 war again overtook Miss Kuo and made her a refugee. Escaping with great difficulty, she headed for the United States, where she is at present.

This is an authentic, intimate picture of the attitudes, feelings and complex problems facing the minds of young China. It will give readers in all the Allied Nations a new and affectionate understanding of modern China.
