The warning of FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover that the nation "is facing a potential army of 6,000,000 criminals" today evolved from Vance Keeney, president of the Exchange Club of Farmington, the statement that Exchange Clubs throughout the nation are spearheading drives on juvenile delinquency in their communities, based upon four highly successful approaches to the problems set up by The National Exchange Club. Detailed procedures for these approaches have been received by the local club.

At the club has the problem of juvenile delinquency become that the federal government has taken heed of its threat to the national welfare. Even now the department of justice is drawing up a plan for a concerted attack, national in scope, on the influences that lead youth into crime.

"Exchange," said Keeney, "is reaching out to eradicate the cause of crime at its roots; to prevent and curb the evil that is feeding the criminal ranks with a never ending supply of recruits. Crime restraint and service to youth have been prime objectives of Exchange almost from the day, 36 years ago, that the first Exchange Club was formed."

The youth study panel of The National Exchange Club's committee on education constantly is devising advanced techniques and new projects and methods for achieving a maximum of service to American youth. The contributions of this youth study panel to solution of the problems confronting the new generation have been an outstanding feature of Exchange.

Exchange is sponsoring four approaches to the problem, namely: 1. A "Community Council for Delinquency Control" coordinating existing community facilities for an attack on all fronts. 2. A "School for Parents." 3. A "Court for Parents," reaching the delinquent parents directly and forcefully and holding them responsible for the actions of their children. 4. A "Youth Center," sponsorship of which is detailed in a manual issued by The National Exchange Club.

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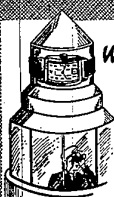
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
