NOGGLE TO JOIN WAR CRIMES STAFF IN EUROPE

Announcement is today made of the appointment of Prosecutor Donald R. Noggle to the staff of Justice Robert H. Jackson, United States Supreme Court Justice in charge of war crimes prosecution in the European Theater, with headquarters at Nuremberg, Germany.

Mr. Noggle received his appointment through the War Department early this spring and is now awaiting sailing orders for himself and family. They will temporarily be housed in military accommodations in Nuremberg until housing facilities now under construction are completed.

Embarkation will be from New York in the early part of August and upon arrival at Cherbourg, France will proceed to a processing center to receive tutoring in military law and procedure. His trial is expected to begin his duties in September. The appointment is for one year with the reservation of his services for a longer period, if needed.

"I am anxiously awaiting this wonderful experience," Noggle said. "It is an opportunity that comes only once in a life-time, especially since there will be occasions necessitating visits to France, Switzerland, England and possibly Sweden and Finland."
