BELL TELEPHONE ANNOUNCES PRIORITY ORDER

Telephone subscribers who move to a new location in the same exchange are now placed in the first order of preference for restoration of their telephone service, the Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced today.

Formerly, residential customers who moved from one address to another were placed in group six of the Civilian Production Administration's priority system governing telephone service.

The amendment by CPA of its U-2 priority order grants additional preference for approximately 15,000 families on the telephone company's waiting list, including 35 in the Farmington area.

There are approximately 90,000 applicants throughout Michigan Bell territory now waiting for service. This figure includes 231 in this exchange.

J. R. MacLachlan, manager for the company, said the job of reviewing all its best orders has been completed. Those that are affected by the new order have been moved up.

"A group one priority will not be itself insure telephone service," MacLachlan said. "Most of our orders are delayed because of a shortage of telephone cable. A priority does not make any more cable available. It does, however, give our group one applicants first opportunity for facilities as they are released by customers discontinuing service."

The CPA priority schedule, as revised, follows: (1) Telephone essential to government, public health and welfare, and customers moving within the same central office area; (2) business customers moving to an adjacent or different central office area within the same exchange; (3) new business service for returned veterans; (4) all other new or additional business service; (5) temporary residence service for serious illness and disability cases; (6) residence customers moving to an adjacent exchange, or to a different central office area within the same exchange; (7) residence service essential to military production, reconstruction, employment and food production; (8) residence service for returned veterans and wives of servicemen; (9) all other applications for main residence service; (10) residence extension telephone.

MacLachlan declared that within each of these groups, as facilities become available, Michigan Bell will continue to install service first to those who have waited longest.

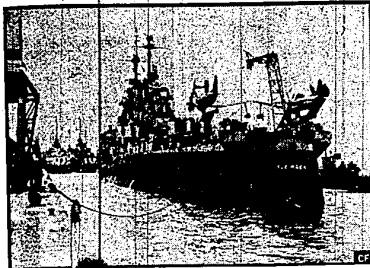

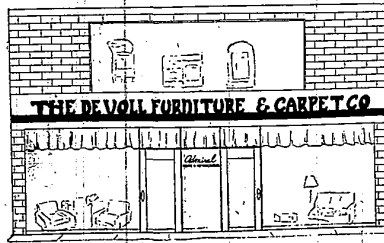
