Farmington Druggists To Attend Rexall Meet

Mr. Maxwell Smith and Mr. Mahlon Bradley, proprietors of the Rexall drugstore in Farmington, will go to French Lick, Indiana, for the regional convention of Rexall druggists there September 16, 17 and 18.

It will be the first such convention for independent druggists since the start of the war, the area comprising the states of Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, West Virginia and Kentucky.

The convention will be attended by executives of the United-Rexall Drug Company, headed by Justin W. Dart. Mr. Dart has won national attention during the past few months as a result of his unique plan for putting the strength of the large national business behind the 10,000 small independent business men who make up the Rexall family. Mr. Dart will outline his "Opportunity Unlimited" program at the gathering.

During the war years, a few specialists worked on the redesigning of drugstore fixtures and equipment to prepare for the postwar era of expansion. This new equipment, and new merchandising ideas created to enable the independent druggist better to serve his community, will be presented at the convention. Mr. Bradley said. 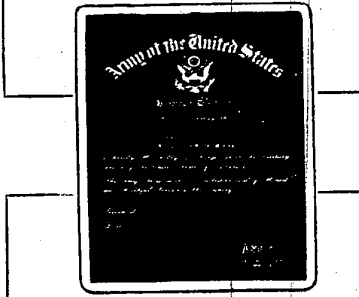
