Frank Labadie moved that Leonard be instructed to notify Oheginski's attorney that the 15 foot strip in question will be released from school interest provided Oheginski gives the Board title to the property where the school stands and that he release the restriction he has placed on the school building. Paul Schreiber seconded the motion and it carried all yeas on a roll call vote.

The Board passed a motion releasing Mrs. Mable Gram from her contract as kindergarten teacher in the Fairview School and granted a contract to Mrs. Lulu Loomis to fill the vacancy.

Miss Emma Lawrence, Pontiac, requested the Board by letter to allow her the use of the Bond School for evangelistic meetings. The Board instructed Superintendent O. E. Dunkel to inform her that the school buildings of the district could not be let to organizations outside of the district, unless locally sponsored.

CHICAGO, ILL. — Shuttled from here to India by chartered Flying Tigers Line and British Overseas Airways Corporation's world's largest single shipment of ball pens from the Reynolds Pen Company is piloted over the Atlantic, the Mediterranean and the Indian Ocean to pen-hungry India by Captain James Messenger, veteran of more than 200 Trans-Atlantic flights, in the British Overseas Airways Constellation Banger II. 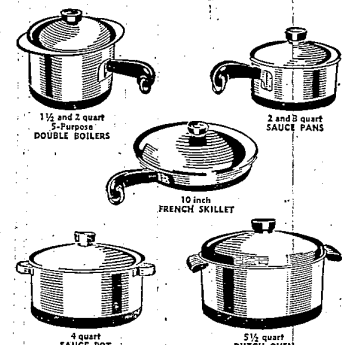
