Trout Vivid Coloring According to the Sportsmen's Service bureau, the fish and wild-life service has discovered a new method of giving hatchery trout the vivid coloration which has heretofore been considered exclusively the property of fish reared in the wild. The answer, believe it or not, is to season the trout's diet liberally with paprika!
