NOVI AMVETS CLARIFY STAND ON POLITICS

On Friday evening, January 17, speaking before a citizens open forum meeting, William H. MacBride, commander of AMVETS Post 75, Novi, gave the following address:

"A situation has arisen which I consider my duty as Post Commander to clarify. It has come to my attention that various citizens of the community have expressed the belief that AMVETS are backing certain candidates for township office. This is entirely in error. We are 100 per cent non-partisan.

"Never has the coming election, or any other election, been included in the agenda of any of our meetings. Our policy, as laid down by the AMVETS State department, is purely of a non-partisan nature as far as politics are concerned. This policy is, and has been, adhered to 100 per cent by our Post. Collectively, as an organization, we are non-partisan.

"Individually it is the right of every citizen, as guaranteed by the constitution of the United States, to support the candidate of his own choice. We who are AMVETS hail this sovereign right, for which we readily sever our country."

"Although it is not customary procedure, I wish to go on record as saying the minutes of any and all of our past meetings are open for inspection by any group or individual or group of individuals who still feel that AMVETS as an organization has shown interest in any candidate for any office.

"I do extend an invitation to any candidate who wishes to attend one of our meetings and address us, as individuals, on behalf of his qualifications for a township office."
