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PEOPLE ARE ASKING THESE QUESTIONS ABOUT ARMY ENLISTMENT



Q. What educational benefits do I get under the GI Bill of Rights?
A. If you serve honorably on active duty for a period of 90 days, one day of which is served between September 16, 1940, and the date of termination of the present war, or you are discharged because of an actual service-incurred injury or disability incurred within that first 90-day period of service, you are, upon discharge, entitled to one year of education in the college, trade or business school of your choice for which you can qualify. In addition, each month of active duty, including the first three, prior to the termination of the war, entitles you to another month of post-service education, up to 48 months.
Your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year will be paid by the government. Also, you will receive \$65 a month living allowance; \$90 a month if you have dependents.

Q. What about family allowances?

A. For men enlisting or reenlisting now, family allowances will continue until six months after the war is officially ended.

Q. What are my chances of going overseas?

A. If you enlist for 3 years, you may select to serve in any overseas theater which has openings, especially Japan or Korea.

Q. Can I still choose the branch of service I want to serve in?

A. Yes. You can pick any branch which has quotas to be filled, if you enlist for 3 years.

Q. Is there any way I can reenlist in my old grade?

A. Yes, you can, if you reenlist for a 3-year term within 20 days after your honorable discharge.

Q. Is there any other way I can reenlist in grade?

A. Yes, if you held one of certain military occupational specialties, and were discharged on or after May 12, 1945, you can reenlist in a grade depending on the length of time you held the desired M. O. S.

RED CROSS NOTES

The blood donor service of the Oakland County Chapter American Red Cross will recruit 600 volunteer donors the week of February 17 according to Harold Blackwood, chairman for Pontiac. The mobile unit of the Michigan Department of Health will be stationed February 17 to 21 at the Ellis Temple, 114 Orchard Lake Avenue. All donated blood will be processed into plasma by Michigan Department of Health after which it will be distributed to local hospitals and physicians. Plasma is not sold but it is made available to local patients who need it.

The only fee is a small charge by the hospital for plasma administration costs.

Mrs. Henry Goodnow will assist Mr. Blackwood as co-chairman and Mrs. John Kent will act as registrar. A number of volunteers will begin registrations January 27, when calls will be received at 4-3575.

To be acceptable as a registrant, donors must weigh at least 115 pounds and must have no acute illness or histories of recent illnesses or operations. Only those who can safely give a pint of blood are accepted by the physicians and nurses attached to the mobile bleeding unit which handles the collection of blood.

In preparation for the clinic, representatives from community organizations will meet January 28 for dinner at the Waldron Hotel, when details of the program will be explained.

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LIBRARIAN REVIEWS NEW BOOK SELECTIONS

Mrs. Florence Leach, librarian of the Farmington City and Township Library, has reviewed three books, which she thinks may be of special interest to patrons of the library.

"The Talking Stone" by Caroline Cunningham is a collection of stories told a thousand years ago in America, around the vanished campfires which once dotted our plains and wooded hills. They tell of a hunter crossing a frozen lake on the ice, of boys shooting with their bows and arrows, of two slaters going out to gather firewood and of a maiden waiting on the shore at twilight, hoping to see a certain handsome young brave come paddling home. Some of these tales are long, some short. All are revealing pictures of very early America told in the pictorial language which appeals to youth and to imaginative maturity. Few Indian or Eskimo stories presented to young people are so authentic.

The second review is of "Green Grass of Wyoming" by Mary O'Hara. All the qualities of human understanding and the feeling for nature and horses, which made "My Friend Flicka" and "Thunderhead" two of the most beloved novels of this generation are again shown by Mary O'Hara in this third volume of the story of the McLaughlin family. Ken, the dreamy little boy who wanted his very own colt in "My Friend Flicka" has grown into a sturdy, self-reliant youngster, eagerly probing the fascinating mysteries of the grown-up world. His brother, Howard, is a West Point Cadet, and a new baby sister has arrived to give new interest and piquancy to life on Goose Bar Ranch.

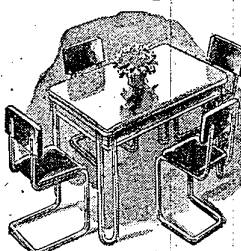
"Lord of Alaska" by Hector Chevigny is a book with plenty of appeal for everyone. Curving from the tip of Asia, along the Aleutian Islands, Alaska and British Columbia, stretches a huge territory where the place names are Russian, the landmarks are the bulbed domes of the Orthodox Church. Today this land belongs to Canada and the United States, but for a century and a quarter it was claimed by Russia. Therein lies a story of enterprise and adventure unsurpassed in the annals of the New World, and virtually lost in the mists of history.

Barana built an empire in a land so remote that even Napoleon's invasion of Russia came to him only as a breath of rumor. The name of Barana is commemorated today only by the range of little known mountains. Chevigny's account of the man will come as a happy surprise to nearly everyone. mere the process of declaring all a part of the public school system and by enumerating each and all as a part thereof."

During the past fiscal year, Mr. Brown points out the state paid out more than \$30,000,000 for educational needs in addition to the

actual amount of state aid to the schools direct. These needs included day schools for the deaf, blind, epileptic, crippled; state schools for the blind and deaf; behavior clinics for delinquents, for county normal teacher training schools, for adult education and for vocational education. The state spent more than \$20 millions for the university and colleges; teacher retirement cost the state about a million dollars.

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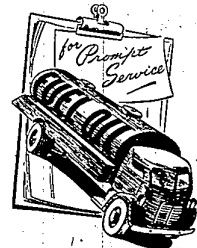

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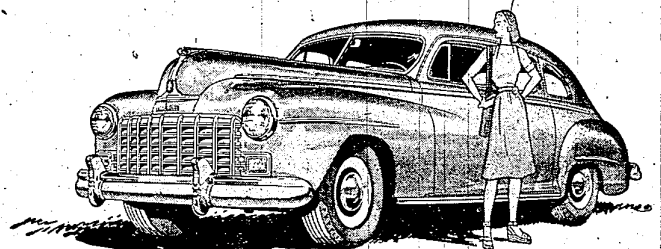
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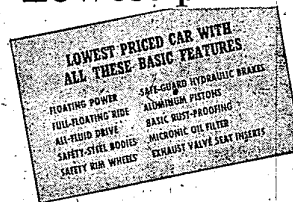
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
