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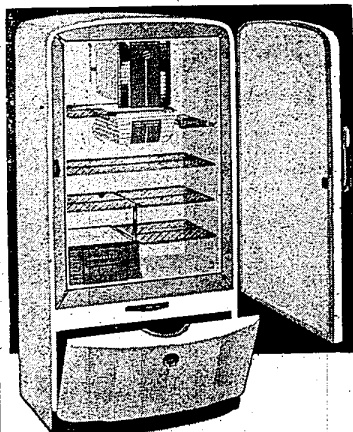
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THE BLUE AND WHITE**NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY MAKES SURVEY**

Approximately 15 per cent of the upper third will be selected. The faculty will judge on the first three qualifications, but scholastic records (60 per cent of the qualifications) are taken from the files. The final decision rests with The National Honor Society Committee composed of Miss Ruth L. Bailey (chairman), Miss Marian Dammon, Miss Mary Alice Lyons, Mr. Gerald Harrison and Mr. Byron Oliver.

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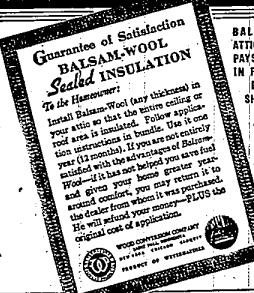
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
