Flower Show To Open In Detroit March 15

With four acres of blooms in the form of Rainbow Gardens, fields of magnificent roses, fields of tulips and other bulbs and gorgeous arrangements of flowers for all occasions, the Spring Flower Show which is to be held at the Convention Hall, March 15 to 23 inclusive, will be one of the most colorful spectacles ever seen in Detroit. The show is sponsored by the Michigan Horticultural Society.

Two outstanding exhibits will vie for the title "best feature of the show": one, an immense Rainbow Garden comprising 35,000 square feet staged jointly by the three largest nurseries in Michigan;—Monroe Nursery and Greening Nursery Co. of Monroe, and Pontiac Nursery Co. of Romeo. The rainbow effect will be carried out with a row of lighted fountains 220 feet in length down an avenue of trees and flowers culminating in the "rainbow gate", a golden waterfall spilling into a golden pool. A rainbow fountain shooting mist 20 feet into the air will reflect a constant change of color, controlled by a color organ which selects the color to correspond with the note of music, similar to the organ which creates such a sensation at the New York World's Fair.

The second feature will be the United Nations gardens, ten small gardens—each one representing one of the cultural nations of the world; a Court of Nations displaying the flags of all the nations and a large modern garden symbolizing the unity of nations. The modern garden will be the setting for the prize-winning piece of sculpture depicting the "Spirit of the United Nations," for which competition is now being held through the Detroit Institute of Arts. To make these gardens authentic, the help of various nationality groups has been obtained through the International Institute.

For the first time in many years, the rose, queen of the flowers, will reign in a magnificent display in which more than 10,000 roses will be on display through the week. Huge bouquets of this perennial favorite, from six to eight inches across and with stems four to five feet long will be arranged in the "Retenue de Roses".

Other features in the show will cover every type of exhibit from the estate gardens of Mrs. John S. Newberry, Mrs. Edgar B. Whitcomb and Fred M. Zeller, to little bi-plants exhibited by any flower lover who grows his plants in a sunny window of his home or apartment and who takes pride in his achievement.

For these people a house-plant competition has been arranged offering \$150 in prizes and open to anyone with a green thumb. Tickets are now available throughout the city in neighborhood stores and florist shops, in an advance sale at less than the regular admission price which goes into effect when the show opens on March 15th.

LOCAL MEN WILL JUDGE STATE BAR ESSAY CONTEST

Fifty-one members of the State Bar of Michigan, including Archie Leonard and Edward Moseman, Farmington, were named Saturday by Laurent K. Varnum, of Grand Rapids, President, to act as judges of the State Bar Essay Contest open to students of any senior high school in the state. Judges were selected according to congressional districts.

Subject of the essay contest is, "The Dependence of Organized Society on Law." Deadline for the submission of student's essays by the principals to the Congressional District judging committee is on or before May 1, 1947. Principals are to supervise judging of manuscripts at each school. Three winning essays selected in each Congressional District will be submitted to a state-wide committee to be appointed at a later date.

A list of the members of the bench and bar who compose the Congressional committees of judges was mailed recently to all high school principals, together with the rules of the contest.

Judges of the contest in the 17th Congressional district are as follows:

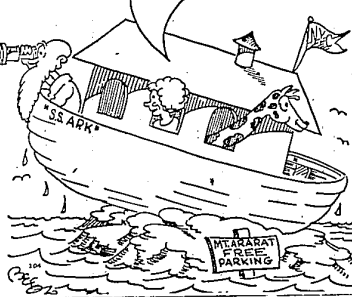

REGISTRATION NOTICE FOR ELECTION TO BE HELD MONDAY, APRIL 7, 1947

To the Qualified Electors of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan:

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law", I, the undersigned City Clerk will, upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special election or a primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter, in said City not already registered, who may apply to me personally for such registration.

Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the twentieth day before any regular, special or official primary election and the day of such election.

Notice is further given to the qualified electors of the City that the undersigned Clerk of said City will register qualified electors who may apply at my office in the City Hall, located at 33312 Grand River Avenue, Farmington, Michigan, Tuesday, March 18, 1947, the twentieth day preceding said election, the last day for general registration, by personal application, for said election, from 8:00 o'clock a.m. until 8:00 o'clock p.m. on said day for the purpose of reviewing the registration and registering such of the qualified electors in said City as shall properly apply therefor.

The name of no person but an actual resident of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such a resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.
