The day of pushing our heads down in the sand is We have a stake in the future world, which is now being formed. The badly mauled word "isolationism" is no longer accepted by the majority of the people. True, we still have a few extremists who believe that embassies and ambassadors are our foreign policy and this is where it should begin and end. Fortunately history and the rapid changing of events is gradually thinning the ranks of these extremists.

Our foreign policy drawn from the minds of men—lawyers, farmers, businessmen, Republicans and Democrats—is the voice of the majority. It has the backing of the American people. There are some who believe it too hard—some not hard enough. One fact still remains—it is our policy. It is sound and it is being carried out by one of America's most capable leaders, General George C. Marshall.

In spite of differences in types of government In spite of differences in types or government, in ways of speaking, in histories and traditions, one common fact remains — right is right. This every country knows, every man regardless of nationality, understands. Upon this one common ground every nation, large or small, can speak. Some governments torn by personalities and political cliques, or domineered by foreign influences, do not want to recognize this fundamental ideal.

Our foreign policy is not one of domination. It doesn't call for the forcing of a democratic type of government on all nations. It does naturally contain many of the principles and ideals of democracy. However, it is not the policy of the State Department to cram our form of government down the throats of our smaller neighbors. If it had been, there would be more democracies in Central and South America. It is rather, to fielth against such domination by force It is, rather, to fight against such domination by force

The United States must, as a large and powerful nation, firmly stand on the ideal of every country to work out it's problems free of coercion and force. It must, with clear cut firmness, impress all nations with the fact that the future peace of the world is dependent upon honesty, respect and understanding.


