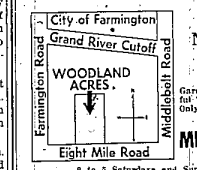
From a lace covered table, centered with an arrangement of bulbs and yellow daffodils, tea and cookies were served, with Mrs. LaVella Noble pouring.
