LATEST WORD IN JACKET BLURB

Books recently added to the Farmington library that may prove of interest to local readers include the following:

"Alfred Street" by Russell McLauchlin. Russell McLauchlin is best known to Detroit News readers as a music critic. His "Alfred Street" is real; it still exists, less than a mile from the middle of Detroit, and runs, as it always did, at right angles to Woodward Avenue. Dinky now with poverty's blight, Alfred Street blooms with beauty under the author's descriptions. The class are gone now and so is the crop of children who used to play and fight beneath them. For those who lived on or near Alfred Street at this time the book brings back many happy recollections of leisurely, neighborly days and summer evenings. Many have memories of other "Alfred Streets" in other towns.

"10,000 Garden Questions" edited by P. P. Rockwell. How is garden book indispensable not only to the beginners, but to the old timers as well. It's more than 1400 pages are a gold mine of information on just about every practical garden problem that thousands of amateurs have sought the answers to. This book is entirely different from any other garden book. In the first place it is based upon more than 25,000 questions actually asked by amateur gardeners. In the second, the answers are not of the usual run-of-the-mill type, but are carefully thought out replies by experts who are today recognized leaders in their various fields.

Another unique feature of "10,000 Garden Questions" is the series of introductions in the ten sections, each covering a different phase of gardening, into which questions and answers have been grouped. Each of these introductions for this volume by an authority in that field. Each one presents, in condensed but comprehensive form, the basic information concerning the subject covered, and thus multiplies for the reader, the value of the questions and answers which follow.

"Hiroshima" by John Hersey. "Hiroshima" is the story of six human beings who lived through the greatest single man-made disaster in history. John Hersey tells what these six, a clerk, a widowed seamstress, a physician, a Methodist minister, a young surgeon, and a German Catholic priest, were doing at 8:15 a.m. on August 6, 1945, when Hiroshima was destroyed by the first atom bomb ever dropped on a city. Then he follows the course of their lives, hour by hour, day by day, building up with sure, quiet artistry the already classic piece which Lewis Gannett called "the best reporting to come out of this war." The New Yorker of August 31, 1946, devoted all its space to this story. News-

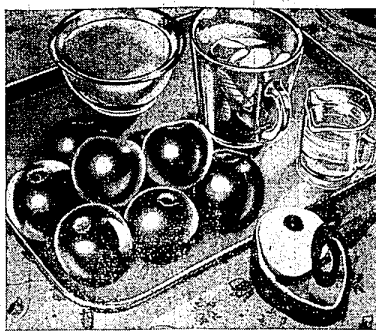
Lewis Clair Button

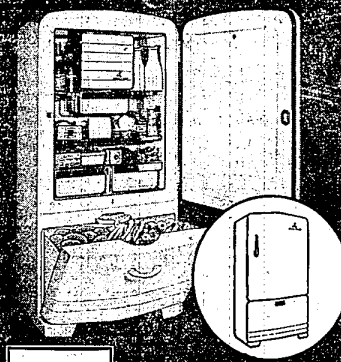
