New books at the Farmington City and Township Library include "Journey to the End of an Era" by Hall. Born a Vermont, Melvin Hall made his first trip to Europe when he was twelve. That journey held some of the fantastic experiences of the very early days of motoring in Europe, Asia and America. He is now retired as a Colonel, and lives in Central France. At 66 he can still look back on an extraordinary career. He is a gifted story teller, with a witty and spirited literary personality which quickly establishes an intimate and favorable contact with the reader, creating a happy understanding that never lets down. One critic declares he out-Hallburton Hallburton while telling of his wanderings.

"Color Blind" by Halsey. In a work in a nondiscriminating serviceman's canteen during the recent war, the author observed an attempt at racial equality and generally she liked what she saw. A good natured, witty and practical way she tells of her experiences there. She shows how every thinking person can do something concrete to help bring about a better understanding between the racial groups. In this provocative book she tears down common misconceptions about sex, intermarriage, and other causes of prejudice, and presents a sensible and sane case for the Negro. This volume will furnish much material for discussion and comment. Many will remember Margaret Halsey as the author of "With Malice Toward Some".

"Sons" by Smirnov. U. A. Smirnov was born in 1904 of a peasant family in the village of Sinitino in the Yaroslavl region. He began writing in 1928, and since 1941 has been a member of the Soviet Writers' Union, to which only the established writers are eligible. During the war he served as a war correspondent. The story of "Sons" revolves around the building of a Russian collective farm. There is in it the same strong stuff which brought the Soviet Union to maturity between the two wars, a broader picture of the New Russia. "Sons" is a powerful story of mother love and courage. In writing of a collective farm, the author has cut deep into the truth of every activity that depends, finally, upon men and women—their doubts, their strength, the evil that is in them and the selfless good. "Sons" is a story of human beings, rather than dialects, and of human values, rather than politics.
