The Board expressed their appreciation for the cooperation of the Jaycees in the Clean-up campaign and welcomed their interest and help.

It was suggested that the Jaycees consist of distributing the handbills to residents, advising them when the trucks would be around to pick up scrap.

Supervisor Ernest V. Blanchard reported that the Oakland County Treasurer has received the first payment from the State of the sales tax monies for distribution to municipalities within the county.

The Veterans' Administration is urging all veterans to have chest x-rays within one year, or at the most two years, after discharge from service, to establish whether or not any chest condition may have arisen since discharge.

Many chronic diseases are considered directly due to service if they existed to a ten per cent degree within one year, and in some cases two years, from date of discharge.
