

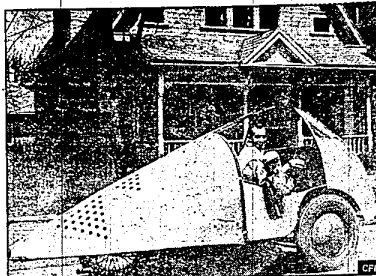

The Harold Millers entertained about thirty guests at dinner on Sunday, the occasion being the confirming of their daughter, Geraldine.

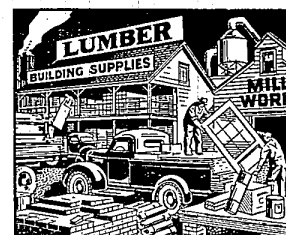
Mr. and Mrs. Al White of the John Farm were called to Kentucky on Thursday by the death of a brother. They will return on Monday.
