

TRACK TEAM WINS TROPHY FOR FARMINGTON

Farmington trackmen waded through mud in the Inter-Lakes Conference meet held in Ypsilanti Wednesday to bring home the track championship.

F.H.S. had a total of 73 points to defeat Milford, who had 66; Northville, 55; and Walled Lake, 12 points.

Those who received letters in the three places received a medal; the fourth and fifth place winners were given ribbons.
