Township Board Refuses License For Pool Room

New Ordinance Is Discussed

Farmington Township officials in the Town Hall were offered to over-throwing Monday evening at a special meeting of the Township Board, by interested residents of the community. The special meeting had been called for the purpose of hearing any complaints that might be made to the licensing of a pool room at 28316 Grand River Avenue, and also to determine to what extent the new Township Ordinance concerning junk yards applies to establishments of this kind. The majority of the people attending the meeting had come to protest against the issuance of a license for the pool room, since the proposed location was adjoining the property of the Clarenceville Methodist Church. Several members of the church voiced their feelings on the matter, as did Rev. Elsie A. Johns, pastor of the church. No one was present who supported the issuance of a license.

Township Clerk Harry McCracken moved that the board reconsider the vote previously taken on the application for a pool room license. This motion was supported by Justice Harry Shifer, and carried. Mr. McCracken then moved that the application be rejected. Justice Ward Eagle supported the second motion, and the board unanimously voted to pass it.
