MICHIGAN BELL ANNOUNCES 1947 CONSTRUCTION PLAN

Thomas N. Lacy, president of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, today announced a \$40,000,000 construction program for 1947.

The program will be the largest in Michigan Bell's history, surpassing the expenditures for last year's record program by over nine million dollars, Lacy said.

He stressed, however, that the planned construction was contingent upon an uninterrupted flow of materials and equipment.

"Our expenditures this year represent an important part of our post-war expansion program which may cost \$220,000,000 during the five years following V-J Day," Lacy stated.

Included in the projects this year are construction of nine new telephone buildings, major additions to 15 others, and either construction of or additions to 15 smaller structures.

Cities to receive new buildings are Ann Arbor, Birmingham, Cadillac, Center Line, Charlevoix, Detroit, Pontiac, Oxford and Reed City.

Major additions will be made to telephone buildings at Ann Arbor, Bay City, Clare, Detroit, Grand Rapids, Hillsdale, Ironwood, New Buffalo, Niles, Potosi, Pontiac, Royal Oak, St. Ignace, Traverse City and Ypsilanti.

Another large item on Michigan Bell's program is \$10,875,000 for 165,000 new telephone instruments.

Lacy estimated that it would take this many telephones to provide service to the 70,000 families now on the waiting list, meet new demand, and continue the job of installing dial service in some manually-operated exchanges.

Communities which are scheduled for dial service this year are Ceresco, Flat Rock, Galesburg, Oxford, and West Bloomfield.

The company last year registered a net gain of 204,000 telephones. Lacy said that although a smaller gain is expected this year, Michigan Bell will surpass the 1946 record installation of central office equipment, outside lines, and cable.

In line with this goal, Michigan Bell will install nearly \$15,000,000 worth of dial switching units and switchboards.

Over 450,000 miles of wire in cable and open lines will be added to increase the number of circuits available for both local and long-distance service — enough wire to encircle the earth 18 times. Cost of this item will be over \$12,000,000.

Nearly two million dollars has been set aside for the purchase of 1,021 new motor vehicles and trucks as replacements and to help handle the increasing load of construction work.

Lacy said a part of the program would be devoted to continued development of telephone service in rural areas and expansion of mobile radiotelephone service to automobiles and trucks.

Michigan Bell plans to provide service to 20,000 new subscribers in rural areas this year and extend mobile service throughout the southern part of the Lower Peninsula.
