

# Schools Find Way To Cut Building Costs

**FARMINGTON** Farmington School District has picked R.E. Dailey and Co. as construction manager for its fifth junior high. The construction manager will guarantee by a contract that costs of constructing the school will remain within the ceiling of his bid.

The construction manager also insures building plans are followed and the building is completed on time.

Since subcontractors are paid as soon as their jobs are completed, they often submit lower bids to the manager.

The construction management method was used for an addition to Stinwassee School saving the district about \$40,000 in construction costs.

**THE BOARD** awarded the bid at Tuesday's board meeting following an investigation of the construction management method which included meeting with three bidding contractors.

Kenneth F. Perrin, board

vice-president, said: "We were very pleased with two of the three contractors we met with. It was great to be in a position where we felt we couldn't have gone wrong with whichever we chose. As it was, R.E. Dailey came in lower."

Bids on construction will be received before the board commits itself. Manager's services before construction will be at a nominal fee with the balance costing \$50,000 in addition to reimbursable expenses.

Cost of the one-story school is projected at \$2.3 million to be provided for under a 1967 bond issue. Board members said the construction management method will provide the district "with a better construction project" and completion by 1973.

**ALSO DISCUSSED** during the board meeting were the 1972-73 tentative operating budget, high school accreditation, the raising of Old Nichols School and the new line.

Revenues and expenses are projected at \$17 million for the 1972-73 school year. This represents about a \$2.5 million increase over the present operating budget of about \$15 million.

Business Manager William Frisk emphasized that the budget is only temporary and can change depending on actual state equalized valuation for next year plus the millage vote on April 21, which affects more than \$1 million in the budget.

The budget must be submitted to the Oakland County Tax Allocation Board by April 17. It includes provisions for programs and expenditures at the same level as this year, in addition to reinstating items reduced from the 1970-1971 operations to balance this year's budget.

**HARRISON High School**, which will boast its first graduating class this year, received its North Central accreditation for the first time.

The North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools accredits high schools in this area of the U.S. which meet certain standards.

As is always the case with the first accreditation, Harrison's is under a provisional status to be reviewed in the future. Farmington's other two high schools were also recently notified that their accreditation has been renewed by North Central.

After being informed of the NCA accreditation, trustees discussed razing Old Nichols School located on Farmington Rd., north of 13 Mile. Frisk said the district has received complaints about the building being used as a "hangout and creating a disturbance."

He added that the building is beyond any refurbishing or rebuilding. The board agreed to the razing with the condition that one final offer to restore the building be investigated first.

If Old Nichols School is razed, the building will be dismantled and all debris removed for its salvage value. There will be no expense to the district.

## Act Controls Students

**FARMINGTON** An ordinance to control unauthorized persons on school property of Farmington schools was enacted Monday night by the Farmington City Council.

The ordinance makes it illegal for persons on school property, or property adjacent to a school, to make any disturbances which would disturb the peace and quiet or good order of any school activity in or out of the school building.

**THE ORDINANCE** also makes it unlawful for persons to remain in a school or on school property without securing permission of the principal.

"The public safety department has had complaints regarding the area around Farmington Junior High concerning loitering children harassing passersby," commented Robert Deadman, acting city manager.

"This ordinance should give police a tool with which to work in close concert with the school people to correct the problem."

The council approved the ordinance and gave it immediate effect. The same ordinance is expected to be discussed at the April 10 meeting of the Farmington Township Board to apply to school property in the township.

**IN OTHER action**, the council appointed former city manager John Dinan as the city's representative on the Farmington Public Library board to fill the unexpired term of James Ebel, who was forced to resign after moving to the township.

The council also reappointed Ernest Sauter to a four-year term on the library board of trustees.

Councilmen approved traffic control orders banning parking at any time on Britany Hill Dr. from Grand River to a point 50-feet south of the bridge.

Another traffic control order bans left-turn

movements for eastbound motorists on Grand River at the northbound leg of Orchard Lake. Eastbound motorists on Grand River still may turn left onto Orchard Lake where it intersects Grand River at 9 Mile.

The left-hand turn ban will remain in effect until the state installs a left-turn signal at Orchard Lake and Grand River at the northbound leg of Orchard Lake.

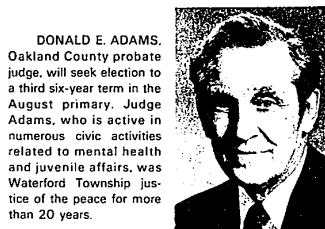
**COUNCILMEN** also authorized Deadman to receive bids to replace six

police vehicles which each has 50,000 or more miles on them and are experiencing excessive repair costs.

Bids will be taken on four patrol cars, one station wagon used for rescue purposes and a standard, two-door hardtop.

Police Lt. Daniel Brynes and Councilmen Ralph Yoder were appointed as the city's representatives on the board of the Farmington Area Advisory Council (FAAC).

Jo Courville was appointed to be the city's chairman of Michigan Week activities this year.
