"Things to Make from Odds and Ends" by Robinson. Is just what the title implies. Over a hundred things for children of all ages to make from materials to be found about the house. Each step in the construction of the article is plain. Here are some of the things to make: colorful neckties, aprons, jewelry, aprons, and even Pinocchio, a hand puppet.

"Three Came Home" by Keith is another good book by the author of "The Land Below the Wind". The Keith family lived in North Borneo and when the Japanese took over they became prisoners of war for three and a half years. In "Three Came Home" the whole story is told of what the war did to this family, how they came to know the value of freedom and to know there is no war without captivity, both of the victor and the vanquished. Even the terrible prison life brought out her sense of humor. It is amazing how she relates her life as a prisoner with out condemning the enemy. Is it war she condemns.

"Class House of Prejudice" by Baruch is a hard-hitting book describing the results and causes of prejudice toward minority groups in the United States. It explains with clarity and force the effects of prejudice both on people toward whom it is felt and the people who feel it.

Dr. Baruch's training and experience have given her admirable equipment with which to write this book. She has taught psychology in colleges and has lectured all over the United States and in Europe on intercultural relations. During the war she served as special consultant on the West Coast Regional War Manpower Commission.

Dr. Baruch believes that prejudice is curable. The final section of the book discusses ways of recognizing and overcoming it. The last chapter includes a series of illuminating questions by which the reader can test his own reactions.

V.F.W. PLEDGES SUPPORT TO Q.V.A.

The 28th Annual Encampment of the Department of Michigan Veterans' Foreign Wars held at South St. Marie June 19-22 elected Merle E. Hopper of Charlotte, as Department Commander, Otto Beaudoin of Detroit, Senior Vice Commander and Herbert Devine of Flint, Junior Vice Commander.

Hopper pledged to assist posts in developing programs which would increase their value to the community; to fight communism; to support a long range veterans' housing program; to work for cash payment of terminal leave bonds; to secure establishment of a National Veterans' Cemetery in Michigan; to work for a strong national defense program, and programs to foster true patriotism.

The Encampment at its general assembly unanimously passed a resolution pledging the full support of the Veterans of Foreign Wars to the successful operation of the State Office of Veterans' Affairs, and also went on record expressing appreciation to the Honorable Kim Sibley, Governor of Michigan, for his fair and considerate approach to the problems of veterans and their dependents, and his support of legislation beneficial to those in the armed forces who by their service in the armed forces of the United States, made it possible for free assembly to be maintained in our great state and nation.
