The Priebe family of St. Francis have returned from vacationing at Long Lake, near Traverse City. Mr. and Mrs. MacClure have tak-



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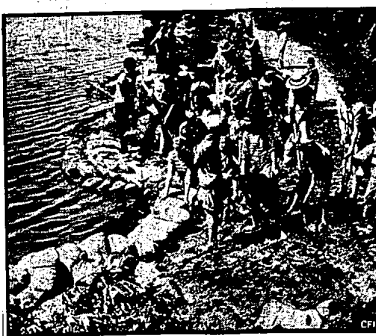
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WORKERS FIGHT TO SAVE LEEVEE

Nutritional Needs
