cans in agriculture, business, labor and government."

Its study, which will probably take a year, is entitled "The Causes of Industrial Peace under Collective Bargaining."

The project is under direction of two special committees composed of both NFA members and non-members. One is a sponsorship committee composed of 40 business and labor leaders. The other is the research committee made up of 28 experts in the field.

The idea was explained to a group of us by Clinton Golden, who will direct the research. Golden is former vice president of the United Steelworkers of America and, more recently, lecturer on industrial relations at Harvard.

Golden explained that what his committee was after was a different approach to the question of labor-management relations. Since 1876, he said, congress or somebody has undertaken a survey every few years of the causes of industrial strife.

"In my opinion," said Golden, a big, slow-talking man with a facile deliberate manner of speech, "the time has come when instead of looking into the causes of conflict which everybody knows so much about, we ought to try to discover how much peace there is, and what makes peace."

Then he made a direct appeal to us—press and radio men—to help compile the names of as many firms as possible where labor and management got on, where they settle their differences without strikes.
