when they are returned to the County Treasurer in March, an application for cancellation of taxes may be filed, thus still giving them the exemption to which they are entitled.

David Allen, owner of the Farmington LaSalle Cab Company, and John Young, owner of the Farmington City Cab Company, appeared before the commission, requesting that the city set a limit of four cabs for operation within its limits, that number being in use at the present time. Upon motion of Commissioner Bagshaw, it was unanimously voted that the clerk instruct all applicants for taxi cab licenses to bring the matter before the commission before any licenses are issued.

Authority was given Fire Commissioner Ken Loomis, and Fire Chief Leo Hendryx to purchase two fire masks for the City fire truck, in compliance with the State Law that all fire trucks must be equipped with two such masks.

Permission was granted Groves-Walker Post 346 of the American Legion, to hold their annual Gala day celebration in the City from August 27 through September 1.

The Commission, wanting a better understanding of the plans of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company for expansion and improvement of service in Farmington, decided to invite a representative of the company to a commission meeting, to outline company plans for this community.

A communication was read from the Zoning Board of Appeals requesting the commission to take some action to have fire escape phones Company at the present time, and the board also recommended the building at 22909 Grand River be condemned. The latter has already been taken care of and approved by the Farmington Township School District property, is being torn down. 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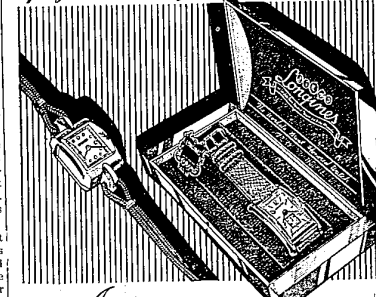
