**Plastic Used in X-Ray**  
 The accurate measurement of X-ray dosages and intensity, a vital function in X-ray therapy, is being aided by Kriston resin, a new thermosetting plastic. Cast into a small dielectric plate, the resin forms an important part of an instrument which eliminates guesswork from X-ray therapy. Before Pearl Harbor, pure amber was used for these plates. War cut off the supply, and the search for a durable dielectric material, Kriston resin was found to be outstanding. Costing only one-tenth as much as amber, a failure of the finished part has not been reported in almost a year.
