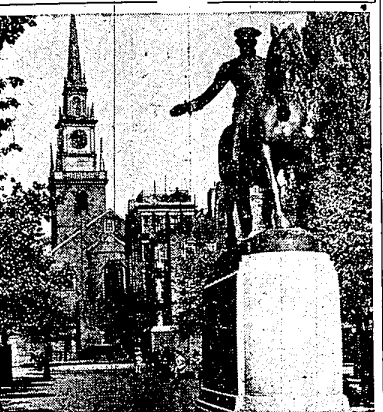

Manioc is a native plant in Brazil. The Indians made large use of it at the time of discovery of America. The first settlers, in the 16th century, learned its use as food from the natives. Since then it has been grown rapidly and constitutes one of Brazil's most genuine crops. Up to 1938 manioc was used for making a meal and as animal feed, as well as starch. Manioc production was then about five million tons a year. Export of the dried manioc chips was started during World War I.

Massachusetts is rich in history and legend and romance and color, and one of the top points of interest is Old North Church, from the steeple of which lanterns warned of the coming of the British. In the foreground is the imposing statue of Paul Revere.

Boston has been called "a state of mind". That may be, but certainly that patinated old town on the Charles River, the town of Paul Revere and the Old North Church, of Old Granary Burying Ground, and the Commons, the city of baked beans and brown bread, well, Boston is Boston, my friends, and you've not seen these United States until you have prowled its narrow streets, visited its patriotic shrines and tasted its delightful food.

Now —

What will you see in Boston? Well, Boston is probably America's most interesting single city of any size — for certainly a very great deal of America's history has been written right in that old town.

You'll see Faneuil Hall, so often called "the birthplace of liberty", and, of course, you'll visit the little home in which Paul Revere lived — it's the oldest house in all of Boston. You'll stroll through Old Granary Burying Ground — in which sleep John Hancock — Samuel Adams — Peter Faneuil — Paul Revere — and Mary Goode, the "Mother Goose" of our childhood days.

You'll go out to Breed's Hill and see the towering obelisk of granite — Bunker Hill Monument — only in Boston you'll never hear it called Bunker Hill. To the Bostonian it's Breed's Hill. It's a safe bet that you'll roll down to Plymouth and stand in reverent silence above the "rock". That old piece of stone is probably America's most sacred single shrine.

You'll want to see famous Old North Church — in the heart of Boston's teeming North End — and you'll be thrilled with the woodwork — the ancient brass chandeliers and the antique treasures with which the old church is filled — including the silver communion service presented by King George II. Old North Church saw its first service on December 29, 1723, and the preacher was the Rev. Timothy Cutler, later president of Yale University. His text was prophetic. It was "My house shall be called a House of Prayer for all people."

Now, more than two centuries later, fifty thousand visitors visit this shrine annually.

If you have the time you'll want to have a brief glimpse of Cape Cod, for that strip of sand and forest, just a mile more than a hundred miles long is an amazing place — home of the old-time salt-water eater — home of the staunch old square-rigger — gone long ago to Davy Jones' Locker — and the hardy old mariners are sleeping in the ancient cemeteries. America's whaling industry just about started down Cape Cod way, for in that early day schools of blackfish, or small whales, would come into the shallows and the villagers would rush out and butcher them for their oil. Well, the Cape Codder wasn't a chap to pass up an opportunity — he couldn't sit at by and wait for the whales to come to him. Pretty soon he was going out after the whales — and many a New England fortune was built by those old-timers whose motto was "a dead whale or a stove-in boat."

All of that Massachusetts country is charming, whether you spend leisurely hours just loafing in Boston Commons and the magnificent Public Gardens or rolling down to Concord and Lexington and into the scores of other picturesque towns over that whole area.

When you have finished with Massachusetts it's simple to head northward into Biddeford and on into Portland, Maine, seeing some of that unusual coast country.

Then start your homeward swing by way of Conway and into the White Mountains. You'll see famous Franconia Notch and the Old Man of the Mountain, Echo Lake and the new Aerial Tramway — you'll probably traverse Crawford and Pinkham and Kinsman Notches, and there's Bretton Woods, of course, one of the country's best known beauty spots. There's Mount Washington beckoning you to spend an hour or so on its gorgeous slopes — St. Johnsbury, Vermont, and Montpelier — and then the Green Mountains — and the crossing of Lake Champlain — all a veritable vista of loveliness through the summer months. Soon after you have crossed Lake Champlain and landed at Port Kent you're in the Adirondacks — Lake Placid and Saranac Lake — all places you've heard about through the years — and then homeward by way of Syracuse and Buffalo.

You'll find New England in its magnificent dress through the summer, for there is a great canopy of green draped over its hills — and the lakes are blue as turquoise under a summer sky.
