The Jewish Community Center will present Israel's prize-winning musical "Only Fools Are Sad," with the original cast from Broadway, April 23-30.

Brought to the U.S. under the patronage of Prime Minister Golda Meir, "Only Fools Are Sad," is an English-language version of a work that won the equivalent of a Tony Award in Israel and has been seen by approximately a third of the entire population of that country.

"Only Fools Are Sad" is an anthology, based on old Hassidic tales, fables and songs which were told and sung in Yiddish in Eastern Europe during the 18th and 19th centuries.
