

AAUW Hosts Austin

Secretary of State Richard H. Austin will speak on "The Problem Driver and Traffic Safety" at 8 p.m. Wednesday, April 19, in the Farmington Community Center.

The occasion is the April general meeting of the Farmington branch of the American Association of University Women.

All those interested may attend. The Community center is located on Farmington Road north of 10 Mile.

IN CONSIDERING the big question of traffic safety, Austin will discuss current resolutions that are pending January 1971.

He has originated as possible legislation, alternatives to the criminal Michigan Conference on the

Problem Driver, which recently completed a five-month study and came up with 25 proposals to improve driving safety in the state.

He also will review the possibilities of making broader use of probationary services, developing court rehabilitation programs for traffic violations, expanding highway traffic safety education and coordinating public information and education programs.

Austin has given considerable attention to the problem of traffic safety in Michigan since assuming the office of secretary of state in January 1971.

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In 1941, he became Michigan's first black Certified Public Accountant and started his own accounting firm.

Over the years, he has helped organize a number of other businesses, philanthropic foundations and civic organizations.

He has served as treasurer of the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments, president of the Booker T. Washington Business Association and founder of an Optimist Club.

AUSTIN ALSO has been active in the NAACP, the Economic Club of Detroit, the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce and the Democratic Party.

Farmington AAUW members Mrs. George Bird and Mrs. Kay Starr will be co-chairmen of the meeting. Assisting them will be Mrs. Carmen Broadhead, Mrs. Joseph Esty, Mrs. John Priest, Mrs. Thomas Howell, Mrs. Bernard McDermitt, Mrs. Robert Kelton and Mrs. Francis Rice.

"Now we're also encouraging groups of children and young people to come out to the track for a daytime visit. It's free then, and the kids can watch the horses work out and go to the barn to see them saddled."

"Then they go to the kitchen for milk and doughnuts and a chance to talk to the jockeys, and they all love it."

SANDY WALKER personally attends the invitations to most groups who come for parties at the track.

During the track off-seasons, Mrs. Walker visits clubs and other groups that indicate an interest in telling them what the track facilities can offer in the way of an outing.

Most members of the organizations she visits rarely have come to DRG, so she explains to them the possible parties - the smorgasbord dinner, the sit-down steak dinner or the admission party, which doesn't include a meal but permits a group to come in on pre-paid admission and have a race named after it.

Sandy has traveled around the state in making her introductions, and has had bookings from as far away as Toledo, Saginaw, Muskegon, Kalamazoo and Port Huron.

SHE THOROUGHLY enjoys playing hostess to each party, but admits to a special fondness for senior citizen groups.

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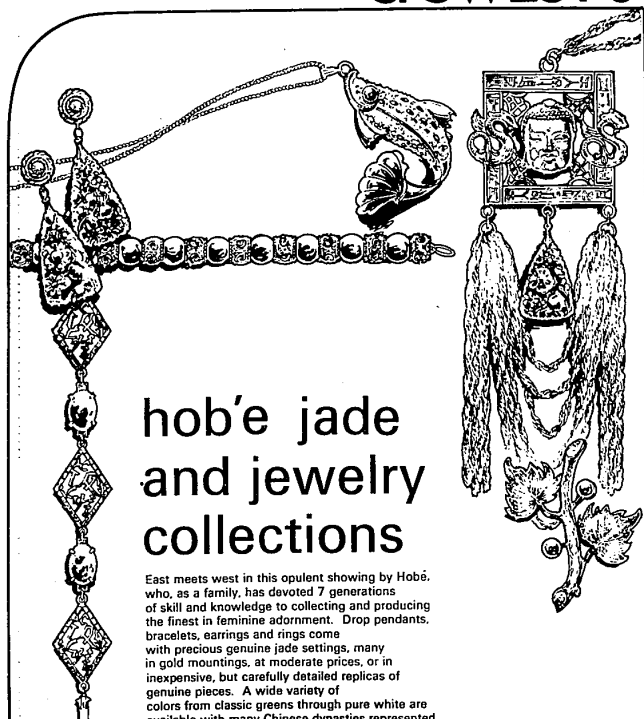
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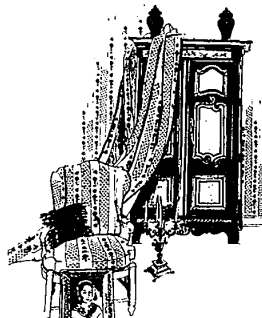
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
